while speaking on the "Role of Landscape Architecture in Reinforcing Positive Attitudes and Creating a Liveable Environment," at the 12th edition of ARCHIFUS, organised by the department of Architecture, Covenant University, Ota on Wednesday, March 21, 2018.

The event which doubled as the 3rd Town and Gown Seminar series of the department in the current semester has "Advocacy by Design" as its theme.

Mrs. Ade-Odiachi, a trained Insurer who through passion veered into Landscape Architecture, noted that despite high-level ignorance about the profession, it adds value to property and environment.

"Landscape Architects are required for parks, schools, stadia, streets, churches and mosque among others. Having a garden increases the value of your property. Studies have shown that people are willing to pay more for a property view with nature," she explained.

Landscape Architecture, she said, has a significant impact on environment that helps define a community and how they interact with each other. She emphasised that a Landscape Architect has to understand design, plants, soil as well as construction and how they could all work functionally together to create a beautiful space.

The guest speaker advised participants, particularly the students to consciously add landscaping to their various projects, which, according to her, would make them stand out among other professionals.

She also advised them to develop problem solving attitude and be resourceful. "Things will not always happen on site as planned on paper. You still have to be able to think on your feet. And in spite of everything, you have to create a beautiful and wonderful landscape."

In his remarks, the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Shalom Chinedu, who stood in for the Vice-Chancellor, Professor AAA. Atayero, appreciated the contributions of staff and students of the department to the development of the University and its proprietor base.

He noted that the department is one that the leadership and the management of the University are proud of, noting that most of the buildings in the Commission and the University were designed by the department." He then declared the event open.

The Dean, College of Science and Technology, Professor Kolawole Ajanaku,



also appreciated both faculty and staff of the department, as he enjoined them to continue to work together in order to change the nation.



Covenant Researchers Receive Patent Rights for Eight Inventions



rofessor Omoleye, a Professor of Chemical Engineering, was the sole beneficiary of the patent for the 'Production of wine

Brand from Hibiscus Sabdariffa'. He and Dr. (Mrs) Modupe Ojewumi, a faculty in the Department of Chemical Engineering, were joint recipients of the patent right for the 'Production of Protein Nutrient from ParkiaBiglobosa Seed'.

The patent right for 'Integrated Dual Powered Electric Automobile Engine' was awarded to Professor Omoleye and Mr. Olusegun Igbamerun, a Senior Technologist at the Covenant University Centre for Research, Innovation, and Discovery (CUCRID). Both were also jointly awarded the patent right for the invention of 'Violation Self Reporting Vehicle Speed Limiter'.


Also, together with Mr. IfeanyichukwuEkem, Professor Omoleye earned a patent right for the 'Production of Dry Fermented Ogi from Corn and Guinea Corn'.

Professor Francis Idachaba of the Department of Electrical and Information Engineering (EIE) was awarded patent rights for two products.

They are 'Pipeline Leak Inhibitor Tool for Onshore and

Offshore Crude Oil Pipeline networks' and 'Offshore Pipeline Monitoring Tool'. Another faculty from the EIE Department, Dr. Victor Matthews, received a patent right for the invention of an 'Intelligent Executive Chair'.

The National Office for Technology Acquisition and Promotion (NOTAP), an Agency of the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology, facilitated the award of patent rights to the Covenant University researchers. NOTAP. amongst other functions, promotes innovation, patenting and intellectual property; offers technology advisory and support services; and commercialization of



Six researchers at Covenant University have been granted patent rights for 8 products, with the Head. Product Development Cluster, Professor James Omoleye, being a sole recipient of one of the patent rights and a co-recipient of 4 others.

Research and Development results.

Covenant ahead of American Varsities in the Field of Disaster and Disaster Recovery

ovenant University maintained her domineering stance in the field of research by

emerging No. 1 among the world's best 5 institutions by scholarly output, in the field of Library; Disaster; Disaster Recovery, with some of the highly ranked universities in the world playing catch-up to Covenant.

Elsevier SciVal, the quick and easy access to the research performance of 8500 research institutions and 220 countries worldwide, in its latest computations spanning the period between 2014 and 2017, has revealed that Covenant University came tops on this topic with an overall research performance of 72 scholarly outputs, 478 views count, and field-weighted citation impact of 44.

New York University and University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, ranked 27th and 37th in the Times Higher Education World University Rankings, emerged 2nd and 4th respectively in the top 5 list of the best institutions in the field of Library; Disaster; Disaster Recovery. Miami University was 3rd and Athlone Institute of Technology 5th.

Remarkably too, two Covenant University authors emerged 1st and 2nd in the list of the top 5 authors worldwide on this topic, by scholarly output. The world's No. 1 author, Dr. Jerome Idiegbeyan-Ose, who is currently the Ag. Director, Centre for Learning Resources, Covenant University, was credited with 3

scholarly outputs, 30 views count, and field-weighted citation impact of 1.25. His research interests are Digital / Virtual Library, Library Automation, Information Needs of Users, School Library Development, Librarians and Publishing, Academic Library, and Information Retrival.

Chidi Deborah Isiakpona (Segun-Adeniran), a Resource Officer at Covenant, ranked No. 2 author in the world, had 2 scholarly outputs, 26 views count, and field-weighted citation impact of 1.87. Her research interests are Copyright, Bibliometrics, Technostress, Electronic Information Resources, and Leadership Styles and Job Productivity.

list of the top 5 institutions worldwide by scholarly output in the research subject of Industry; Applications; Visually Impaired.

Covenant, according to the latest computations by Elsevier SciVal, the quick and easy access to the research performance of 8500 research institutions and 220 countries worldwide, emerged the best on this topic with 37 scholarly outputs, 590 views count, and fieldweighted citation impact of 35.

Higher School of Economics, Jilin University, Moscow State University, and Tokyo University of Technology completed the list of the world's top 5 institutions on this topic in that order.

Also, Professor Ambrose Azeta, the leading author on this topic at Covenant University, was ranked No. 1 in the list of the top 5 authors worldwide in Industry; Applications; Visually Impaired. Professor Azeta, who is a faculty in the Department of Computer and Information Sciences, had 3 scholarly outputs, 36 views count, and field-weighted citation impact of 1.77. His research interests include Artificial Intelligence in Education, e-Learning, and Dialogue Systems (Voice-Enabled Systems).

Other Covenant members of faculty in the expanded list of the world's top authors on this topic were Dr. ItorobongInam (6th) and Dr. AdewoleAdewumi (9th) both of the Computer and Information Sciences Department.

Building Capacity is Vital to being a Global Employee- Expert



T

he universality of the human capital resource has been identified as one of the most significant imports of globalisation, which has

made organizations to have unfettered access to new pool of human capital from any area in the world.

The assertion was made by the Group Head, Compensation and Benefit, First City Monument Bank Limited (FCMB), Mr. Kolawole Amusa, at the Town and Gown seminar of the Department of Business Management, Covenant University, on Friday, February 23, 2018.

Mr. Amusa, who was the guest speaker at the seminar, but represented by Mr. Olumide Ekun, said that while the current wave of globalization might seem a threat and increased competition to some, it avails the resourceful others with greater options, compared to the seeming threat and competitiveness associated with it. According to him, while a legal tender in one clime may not be acceptable in another, the same cannot be said about skills in various areas of career professionalism.

He noted that with increase in creative disruptions via technological innovations, the number of people not willing to follow traditional career path are multiplying, with strong emphasis on capacity building and increased new skillset, developing flexibility in the ever increasing marketing conditions, and there is a paradigm shift from just securing a job.

The guest speaker stated that most work environments are where advance education for industrial relevance actually starts from, when education from academic settings are exhausted.

He identified employability and hard and soft skills as the various skill levels that help professionals to develop necessary capacity towards maintaining global relevance. "Employability skills are basic and transferable. They are needed to become employable. The hard skills will naturally help such individual secure a job, while the soft skills will always be needed to help retain the job," he added.

Mr. Amusa, who was former Head, Employee Services, First City Monument Bank (FCMB) Limited, told the gathering that amid the disruptive way things are now done, it is expected that those seeking relevance must of necessity, position themselves for the future.

According to him, "To be relevant in the new world of work, you must develop your abilities, both individually and collectively to meet up with set and achievable objectives, perform new functions, solve problems and develop means and conditions required to enable existing and new processes."

He posited that human capital is asserted to be the most important element of any successful business, and organizations are ready to compete to get and retain the best of them so as to compete at the highest level of competency. The process of developing and building capacity of spotted talent, he noted, entails recruiting, developing capacity, and retaining identified talents that would help drive global relevance.

He challenged the students of human resources management, who desire to make a mark in the industry, to carry out a selfevaluation of their competency as it relates to trending skills in the industry, avail themselves of opportunities as it relates to training courses, seminars, symposia, job volunteer programs and mentorship scheme, and above all constantly re-evaluating themselves and embarking on continuous learning, which are essential strategies for personal success.

Mr. Amusa averred that the fast-paced world has imposed on those who seek global relevance in the world of work to be ready to take initiative by proactively equipping themselves for the environment they seek to compete in, as knowledge, in itself, is becoming more obsolete, with technology and human behaviour changing the world.

Covenant Accountancy Students Gain Exemption from 11 ICAN Subjects

Covenant Accountancy Students Gain Exemption from 11 ICAN Subjects



Covenant University and the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Nigeria (ICAN), on Wednesday, April 18, 2018, signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) under the ICAN Mutual Cooperation Agreement with Tertiary Institutions (MCATI), which exempts undergraduate Accountancy students of Covenant from 11 subjects of ICAN's professional examination.

Department of Covenant University would be granted 11 subjects exemption, which is the highest number of exemptions granted to any ICAN student as against 7 subjects exemption granted to students whose universities are under the normal ICAN accreditation scheme," said Alhaji Zakari.

He added that the offer represents full exemptions from Foundation and Skills levels of ICAN Professional Examinations.

In his remarks, the Vice-Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor AAA. Atayero, said that it was a thing of joy for Covenant that an institution as formidable as ICAN found the University worthy of partnership. He added that partnerships like this are what the University needs to correct the ills currently besetting the Nigerian society and Africa at large.

The Vice-Chancellor reassured ICAN of Covenant's full commitment to the success of the 2018 International Academic Conference of the body being hosted by the University. He said the University would offer the required support to ensure the success of the conference as well as support professional participation.

He encouraged ICAN officials to see the International Academic conference as a platform for a wider impact that would help shape and transform the participants and the society at large.

Also at the meeting were the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Shalom Chinedu; Registrar, Dr. Olumuyiwa Oludayo; Director, Financial Services, Pastor Sunday Abayomi; Dean, College of Business and Social Sciences, Professor Philip Alege; Director, Vice-Chancellor's Office, Professor David Omole; Head, Department of Accounting, Dr. Olubunkunola Uwuigbe and representatives of the Legal Unit.

Sociologist Charges Undergraduates to be Enterprising



sociologist cum banker, Mojibade Sosanya, has urged students in the D e p a r t m e n t o f Sociology of Covenant University to see their

subscription to the program as a foundational background needed to function at an optimal level in whatever other career path they may choose to tow later in life.

Speaking on the topic, 'Digital Business Development in the Banking Industry: A Sociologist at Work', at the first Town and Gown Seminar of the Omega Semester, in the department on Friday, January 19, 2018, Miss Sosanya said apart from the fact that every sociologist is a potential solution provider to societal problems, the discipline imbues graduates of the programme with the capacity to be broad and creative thinkers, appreciate different customs and traditions and take interest in how they evolved instead of only judging them as good or bad.

The 2011 graduate of Sociology from Covenant dispelled the erroneous notion that the discipline of sociology is an academic profession. She said there are many places outside of the academic environment, where sociology can be used

to enhance personal and professional development.

Miss Sosanya, who currently works with Access Bank in the Digital Business Development unit, where she is involved in the implementation of digital intervention, noted that sociology is not just about having common sense.

According to her, "Sociology has proven to be very

much helpful for the banking sector because it is the study of social life and focuses on the interaction between customer groups and financial institutions and their influences on each other."

Miss Sosanya, who was the Female Vice-Chair of Covenant University's Students' Council in 2011, advised students in the department to constantly affirm their conviction in their choice of program, as that will always help them to come out right.

"Individual limitation in life is not a function of the discipline or program you undertake, but a function of your attitude towards the program. No one can ever make you feel inferior without your consent. Do not settle



for less, when you can be whoever you want to be," she counseled.

In his welcome address, the Head, Department of Sociology, Professor Patrick Edewor, said the department will be repositioning its Town and Gown program to deliver on the intended mandate, which includes boosting research endeavors that address pertinent industry problems and empowering students in the department as they interact with industry players for an enhanced academic performance.

The Town and Gown is the third in the 2017/2018 academic session and the 17th in the series in the Department of Sociology since the initiative started.

Expert Urges Student Engineers to Embrace 'Stempreneurship'




distinguished Materials and Metallurgical Engineer, Professor Toyin Ashiru, has urged student engineers to e m b r a c e 'Stempreneurship' as

STEM education (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics), is very vital to the future and shapes humanity's everyday experiences.

He gave the charge on Wednesday, March 21, 2018, while delivering a lecture titled, 'Developing Entrepreneur Engineers to Bridge the Gap Between Town and Gown in Emerging Economy', at the Town and Gown seminar of the Department of Mechanical Engineering, Covenant University.

The Guest Speaker said that, beyond entrepreneurship, a policy for developing 'Stempreneurs' was needed to add value by creating industry solutions with commercial viability. He added that Nigeria needs 'Stempreneurs' to develop from a consumer to a manufacturing economy, such that when



STEM meets entrepreneurship innovation happens.

"Science equips us with knowledge about our natural world; technology covers computers and smartphones, television, radio, and even the first wheel; engineering encompasses buildings, roads, and bridges, and also tackles today's challenges like global warming; while mathematics is the cradle of all creations and boosts our power of reasoning and problem-solving skills," he explained.

Professor Ashiru, who is currently the Group Managing Director/Chief Executive Officer of Tricontinental Group and a member of the Council for the Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria (COREN), posited that beyond the classrooms, there is need to work on the employability of graduate engineers, combining education with university/industry collaboration and eliminating skills mismatch and challenges with local content.

The University Don encouraged the Government to harness talents hy putting in place suitable policies that will encourage STEM innovations across Universities and other related institutions in the country.

Earlier in his opening remarks, the Head, Department of Mechanical Engineering, Professor Sunday Oyedepo, encouraged the students to be focused in order to take away the necessary nuggets that would guide them in making decisions in the future as they progress in their career. He noted that the experience of the speaker of the day was too vast to be trifled with and would make a huge difference in their journey as engineering practitioners.

Others at the event were the Dean, College of Engineering, Professor Christian Bolu, members of faculty, and staff of both the College of Engineering and the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

The IAESTE team comprised of the association's President, Professor Bernard Baeyens, the Vice-Chancellor of the Federal University of Petroleum Resources, Effurun, Delta State, Professor AkaehomenIbhadode and the Programme Manager/National Secretary IAESTE, Mr. Ahanor Otabor.

Situating the purpose of the visit,

Professor Ibhadode, said that it was designed to be a medium for rubbing minds with the Covenant management as regards the furtherance of the fledgling relationship between the two parties.

The IAESTE President, Professor Bernard Baeyens, in his comments, explained that the mission of the IAESTE is to operate a high quality practical training exchange programme between member countries in order to enhance technical and professional development.

He said that the core objective of the IAESTE is the exchange of students for technical experience on a bilateral or multilateral basis and the further development of these services. He expressed hope of a deeper and more committed partnership with the University. "I think it is very important for the students to see the world," Professor Baeyens enthused." difficult to find any news organization that is worth its salt today where one of the four key line editors is not a graduate of English.

According to him, "There is no desk in the newsroom where a graduate of English Language cannot work, whether it is the business, politics, Op-ed, online, news, community, tourism, sports, and aviation. Expect to do a lot of work".


The veteran media practitioner told the audience that many professional colleagues on different editorial desks would rely on the expertise and knowledge of the English Language graduate to properly contextualize a report for easy reading and understanding of consumers of news materials.

Covenant Supports NUC's Education Reform Initiative



he Management of Covenant University has offered its support to efforts by the National Universities Commission (NUC)

to identify and address problems in the higher education landscape of the country.

This offer of solidarity was made recently when representatives of the NUC under the aegis of 'NUC Strategic Mission Visit on Higher Education Reform in Nigeria' paid a courtesy call on the Covenant Management.

Speaking during the visit, the leader of the NUC team, comprised of members of the newly instituted 'Strategy Advisory Committee', Dr. Joshua Attah, stated that one of the goals of the current NUC Executive Secretary, Professor Abubakar Rasheed, was to interact with key officers of Nigerian universities, in order to elicit relevant information needed to identify problem areas in the nation's education sector and to create solutions towards addressing them.

According to Dr. Attah, who is also the Coordinator, Africa Centres of Excellence, the desire to solve these problems had necessitated the setting up of the Strategy Advisory Committee by the executive secretary of the NUC. He said that his team, which will be visiting a number of universities to engage with stakeholders, had chosen to start with Covenant University (a privately-owned institution) to demonstrate that the NUC identifies with all the nation's universities, public or private.

Dr. Attah stated that one of the issues bordering the NUC is that of access. He explained that about 2 million students are being churned out from the secondary schools annually, trying to gain admission into the universities, but the entire carrying capacity is just about 500,000, with about 1.5 million having nowhere to go even if they meet the requirements of entering into the university.

The NUC, he said, is also concerned about the relevance of existing curricular, availability of facilities, and the quality of manpower in the universities.

In his response, the Vice Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor AAA. Atayero, thanked the NUC team for making the University its first point of call. He agreed with the team that it had become imperative to reform the Nigerian university system, in order to drop obsolete curricular and adopt more viable, relevant, and innovative practices.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that Covenant University is still a work in progress, but has thus far been a propagator of the departure philosophy, which seeks to make great strides through innovative and unconventional means. This, he said, is because the mission of the University is to raise a new generation of leaders, not a new generation of job seekers.

He encouraged the NUC team to move on with the idea of reforming the educational sector, as that was the only way to do things differently. He stressed that the decision of the NUC leadership would aid change and progress in the nation's education landscape.

The NUC officials interacted with other members of the Covenant Management, who contributed their thoughts and ideas concerning the areas they believe should attract changes in the Nigerian university system. The team also met with some Professors of the University as well as a number of students, with whom they interacted asking questions and receiving relevant answers towards the achievement of the reform goals.

Others at the meeting were the Registrar, Dr. OlumuyiwaOludayo; Director, Financial Services, Pastor Sunday Abayomi; Dean, School of Post Graduate Studies, Professor Samuel Wara; Dean, College of Leadership Development Studies, Professor Amos Alao; representative of the Dean, College of Engineering, Professor David Orodu; Dean, College of Science and Technology, Professor Kolawole Ajanaku; Dean, College of Business and Social Sciences, Professor Philip Alege; Director, Vice-Chancellor's Office, Professor David Omole and other senior officers of the University.

TechWomen Mentors Stress the Importance of Women in STEM Development



echWomen mentors from Silicon Valley, California, United States, have emphasized the significance of women

in the growth of careers in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM).

An Initiative of the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, TechWomen empowers, connects and supports the next generation of women leaders in science, technology, engineering and mathematics from Africa, Central and South Asia, and the Middle East by providing them the access and opportunity needed to advance their careers, pursue their dreams, and inspire women and girls in their communities.

Mentoring young women on Tuesday, March 20, 2018, at Covenant University, where they hosted a professional development workshop with the topic, 'The Future of STEM: Why Women Belong Here!' some of the TechWomen mentors spoke about their personal and professional challenges and accomplishments as women in STEM.

Addressing the issue of whether women belong in STEM, Ms. SauraNaim, Senior Director of Enterprise Business Operations at Juniper Networks, said that women are needed in leadership because they are good at collaborating and delivering results. A lot of business elements, she noted, make a technical company work. "I work at a \$5million company. We are a networking company, and we ensure the company meets its strategic objectives," she said.

Naim added that men can support women by speaking up and enabling equality, and this is important because "together we achieve success".

The Head of Global Diversity and Inclusion at Mozilla, Ms. Larissa Shapiro, who made a



presentation on 'Building Your Personal Brand', told the participants that diversity provides rich and well-articulated thought in a team; different kinds of thinkers solve different problems; empathetic people solve end user problems; and one's value is both in the quality of her work and in the perspective that she belongs.

Dwelling on the issue of why women belong in STEM, Dr. JeanniceFairrerSamani, who is a technologist, academic and serial entrepreneur, shared with the audience what it means to have allies. According to her, it is important for men and women to come together to build new technology; have diversity on the table so that the best can be selected; have a relational interchange, and have somebody to champion one through the next assignment.

The participants, featuring students of Covenant University and the University of Lagos, including pupils from different secondary schools, were subsequently grouped into three for breakout sessions, during which the TechWomen mentors spoke on various topics.

Prior to the commencement of the workshop, the Management of Covenant University hosted the 16-member delegation of senior women technology executives from Silicon Valley to a luncheon reception, where there was a brief interaction.

The Registrar, Covenant University, Dr. OlumuyiwaOludayo, had in his introductory remarks said that the University currently drives the vision of becoming one of the top 10 universities in the world and is very close to the vision already. He explained that the University, which has about 204 women faculty, with 103 of them in the fields of science and engineering, sees a partnership with TechWomen as something that could help the institution drive its vision.

Responding, the Lead, TechWomen at Institute of International Education, San Francisco, Ms. Jillian Scot, who led the delegation, thanked the Covenant Management for giving her team the opportunity to explore the University and meet with the students. She said that TechWomem mentors strengthens participants' professional capacity, increase mutual understanding between key networks of professionals, and expand girls' interest in STEM careers by exposing them to female role models.

submitted.


The Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor Shalom Chinedu, while declaring the conference open, noted that _____

"It is clear that Biotechnology is very important in tackling these global challenges. Research and innovation have been identified as the only way to deliver new sources of sustainable





ovenant University, at its 13th convocation ceremony held on the 20th of July, 2018 graduated a total of 1522 students for first

degrees from 32 programmes while a total of 365 were listed for postgraduate degrees. Out of the 1522, 238 had first class, 746 had second class upper, 452 second class lower while 86 were in the third-class category.

Miss Salami Flourish from College of Science and Technology, Department of Industrial Chemistry had the overall best result with an astounding 4.99 grade point average. Other students with high grade points include Oladipo Okikioluwa (4.97) of Banking and Finance from the College of Business and Social Sciences (CBSS), Ariyo, Deborah (4.92) of Psychology from the College of Leadership and Development Studies, Ahaotu Chiagoro (4.98) of Electrical and Electronics Engineering from College of Engineering.

CoE had the highest number of first class graduates (93), followed by CBSS with 76, CST with 53 and 16 from CLDS. In the second-class upper category, CoE took lead again with 241 students in the position, followed by CBSS with 233, CST at 188 and 84 from CLDS. CBSS took lead at the second-class lower division with 141 students. CST had 129, CoE at 124 and CLDS at 58. CST had the highest number of third class graduates with 35 students, 19 from CoE, 18 from CBSS and 14 from CLDS.

No fewer than 104 prizes including cash were awarded to students who emerged tops at college, school, department, programme and course levels.



In the words of a participant, Damilare Bello, the boot camp experience has been challenging and exciting and if there were to be another one, she would gladly sign up for it. She explained how the experience was completely off from what the classroom would usually teacher and an eye opener to a world outside of the curriculum.

Moved by the increasingly amount of problems in the world and the need to solve these

problems with the skills and knowledge gained over time, members of ENACTUS set out to create three projects including;

The PET to diesel project tagged 'Recr8', a project that solves the problem of improper disposal of waste while creating value from plastic waste. The second project is called 'Ryte Light' which is aimed at creating an alternative source of energy with affordable solar bags and shoes. The final project centres on mobility impaired persons, 'Limitless' caters for the needs of these persons by providing them with vocational training and IT skills while linking them up to companies that require their services.

The Start-up Boot camp is the third programme that provides students enough experience and knowledge to accelerate their ventures in two weeks. Willing students on submission of registration fee are provided feeding and accommodation as well as certificates to validate their experience at the Start-up Lab. On commencement of the programme, students with existing business ideas were grouped into eight



different teams and were tasked with developing their business ideas into working ventures. Students underwent training, lecture sessions and mentorships as an incubation period to prepare them for the world business and entrepreneurship. They were taken to established start-ups such as Paystack, Softcom, Lead Space etc to learn from their failures and get acquainted with the basics of running a business. At the end of the programme, each team was to pitch their ventures to a set of Judges and in turn get the chance to win a sum of 1 million naira as capital to run their businesses.


Five teams were gifted the opportunity to receive the capital with respect to the criteria set by the Judges; scalability, providing a solution and necessity. Some of the teams includes QUINSA, a startup that creates a new workforce of physically challenged persons in the world of IT and provides skills, portfolio and network. BAINE is a host service providers that gives brands the chance to leverage on the equity of other brands by joining the community of brands set up by BAINE. SAFE HANDS is an insurance model that secures your devices from damages with their premium payment model whilst shrinking insurance policies. DATOS.IO, provides a framework through which medical practitioners access data from, across hospitals anywhere which would be key to making more accurate decisions and solving the problem of misdiagnosis. TROLLEX is a comparison search engine that enables you purchase a product in the fastest time

possible whilst CREATIVE BRANDS is social network platform where people with different skill-sets showcase their works so as to be easily accessible by customers INVEST NAIRA seeks to create an African investment community and finally NEAT.LI is A website that creates and manages virtual queues to save money and manage resources.


#BootcampExperience2018 is a programme that serves as a base for entrepreneurial activities and hub for business minds to execute the Start-up ideas that the classroom doesn't give them opportunities to. 

As a Nigerian story teller and filmmaker y based in Los Angeles, I int the Nigerian in me to be

before any other thing. why when I meet people say my name is **'Terwase** Akanyi'.

e you pursuing a career in king?

ter my bachelor's degree, I to become a filmmaker my story telling skills to se. That is why I never o this as a career but my u can take a break from because that's your career n never take a break from ting because it's my life. aking starts from the very I think about that false nich is every single day.

nre of film do you produce

Strictly, I make dramas because it's the perfect summary of life. I write from past experiences, interesting ideas and what I wish for the future. However, they all have to be life based.

Kindly tell us about your journey through New York Film Academy.

My NYFA experience wasn't pleasant however, was the necessary experience for me to have to grow into the film maker I am. If it was pleasant, I would have never known my full potential.

Being Nigerian, I struggled with finding actors that suited my stories. All I knew was Nigeria and its people's way of life and I couldn't write anything that suited foreign especially white actors. A foreigner mother will never cry the way a Nigerian mother cries. Our natural instinct as Nigerians is to turn to prayers, whereas their natural instinct as US citizens is dialing 911.

However, I soon realized that I had to explore the power of creation I have as a storyteller. I had to think outside the norm and write universal stories. Create a Nigerian problem and have a Lebanese solution for example. That way, I forced myself to read up about different cultures and merge them to create something new but still derive the exact same emotion from the screen and audience.

A major challenge was that prior to moving to the US, I understood I had to be dependent on my family and my family could very well afford it. However' a year into film school, the Nigerian economy crashed and that affected me greatly. I couldn't enjoy Los Angeles the way I had envisioned. I

ing Nigerian, I truggled with ding actors that d my stories. All I was Nigeria and cople's way of life I couldn't write thing that suited reign especially white actors. couldn't afford the new and trendy clothes so I had to wear my Ankara to events and gatherings. That turned out to be my biggest blessing because that pushed me to actually engage with people and network. I always stood out cause of what I wore. These people were fascinated and curious about me. I decided to milk it.

How did studying in Covenant University prepare you for the international film industry?

Piggy-backing off my last point, whenever I engaged and networked with people in Hollywood, they would end up telling me how surprised as to how much I knew and how deep my discussions tend to get.

Being a person of the dark skin color in the US, it is very likely to get judged by people because of that. And with everything happening to African American men in the hands of police and society in general, my skin color has made me an equal target as well. However, Covenant University molded me into a young man that stands out by the way I speak; carry myself, dress and who I am associated with. It is very easy to move to this country from an African nation and be engulfed in the fire that burns the justice of this country. But with integrity and faith one can never be mistaken for a trouble maker.

What projects did you work on while studying at NYFA?

I came to film school for my Masters degree in film making, and so I learnt all the parts of film making from writing of the script to editing of the picture, Hence, I have been involved in lots of film. I do consider myself a Director but when I am not directing, I contribute to films by being the First Assistant Director of a film.

Some projects I have directed include a short film called Still Waters. It's about a young man who STREAMMAGAZINE • PG. 31 encounters an Angel in limbo who helps his get rid of the self guilt over his brother's death.

My thesis movie is called 0404 Peach back street. It tells a story of two women, one is a real estate agent while the other, is an elderly buyer, who meet during an open house and bond over the challenges of marriage. It has currently embarked on its film festival run.

Now as a First Assistant Director, I have worked on over 30 films and counting. Ranging from period pieces, to horror films and, psychological thrillers.

One of my most exciting projects as a director was during the 2015 World Special Olympic games hosted by Los Angeles. I was contacted by my school to follow the African Delegates and make a short documentary about their experience. That was an experience money can't buy. Meeting and talking with many athletes who have autism, Parkinson's disease e.t.c, and watching them compete with the most honest display of sportsmanship made me see the heart in the part I have chosen to dedicate my life to.

What projects are you currently working on?

I'll be directing my first Fashion Film in a couple of weeks. It's titled 'Right'. It is a fun short comedy.

I am currently directing a web series called 'I hear you'. It is an exciting dramedy on deaf culture. It follows 5 college students who are either deaf or unexposed to deaf culture in a new school that doesn't cater to the deaf. I am absolutely in love with the experience because not only is it an interesting story but all the deaf actors are really deaf and it is a challenging honor for me to direct deaf actors whom are some of the best actors I have ever worked with.

What contribution or impact do you want to make on the international film

scene?

I have seen some of the most beautiful films come from international, independent filmmakers. By that, I mean outside the control of the Hollywood studios that only care about money as opposed this special gift of providing the audience with an emotional escape. That is the filmmaker I pray to be. I want my stories to cause a change of emotion and thought in my audience. There are thousands of filmmakers like that in the world and I want to join that exclusive league of filmmakers who don't have 50 million dollars to spend on a film but create artistic, emotional masterpieces.

To top it off, I am Nigerian. I come from a country with over 200 distinct tribes. That is over 200 ways to say 'I love you' that the rest of the world hasn't seen in movies before.

So, when should we expect you to release your work in the cinema?

I have made only short films so far and one them is currently on a festival run. I do plan to submit it to film festivals in Nigeria after its course on the international scene. Looking at mid next year for that then, people can attend these festivals to see my movie.

Are you considering doing some projects in Nigeria or are you planning to have any collaboration with a Nigerian film maker?

I do not wish to collaborate with any current mainstream Nigerian film makers just because there is definitely a difference in product.

Currently open to and, seeking investors.

Any word for the aspiring filmmakers?

I want people to realize that the film industry is a lot more that what they think. There are many ways to call yourself a filmmaker and many departments in film making. And shining light on these departments can help create employment, help the economy and lead to an up rise of the Nigerian cinema.



Ota Indigenes to Pay More Attention to Personal Hygiene

he Vice-Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor AAA. Atayero, has urged the people of Ajenifuja in Ado-Odo/Ota Local Government Area of Ogun State to pay more attention to personal hygiene in order to live a life devoid of sickness and frequent visit to hospitals.

Professor Atayero spoke through his deputy, Professor Shalom Chinedu at a Free Medical Services program organized by the University's Community Development Impact Initiative Committee (CUCDIIC), to commemorate the World Health Day on Saturday, April 7, 2018 at Isokanlawa Community Secondary School, Ajenifuja, Ota.

This year's World Health Day was themed, "Universal Health Coverage: Everyone Everywhere,"

The Vice-Chancellor observed that lack of personal hygiene and environmental


cleanliness contributes greatly to ill-health, often culminating in high mortality rates among the people, particularly children. "What kills many people are little things unattended to which accumulated and grow beyond manageable conditions," he said, as he urged them to pay attention to their health. He also promised the indigenes that the University would assist them in some areas of need as requested by the Central Chairman, Isokanlawa Community Development Association, Mr. Wale Komolafe.

Earlier in his remarks, the Chairman, CUCDIIC, Dr. Emmanuel Amoo noted that the programwas part of the numerous community development services usually carried out by the University and geared toward imparting positively on the lives of the people, especially in its host community, Ota and its environs.



A total of 303 adults and children benefited from the program which featured a free health awareness talk, vaccination, drug distribution, blood pressure measurement, blood sugar screening, dietary counseling, eye checks, as well as distribution of free eye glasses.



The 2018 edition avails recipients' the strategic opportunities to meet and engage with global leaders including America's former First lady, Laura Bush and create new channels of dialogue with academic leaders from around the world.

The Fellowship will also provide greater access to international study and research for the recipient's institution which will develop new and more profound international opportunities for students, scholars, faculty, and exchange visitors at their home institutions.

Furthermore, this will increase global competence among students, faculty members, and administrators of the recipient's institutions as well as strengthen institutional relationships with higher education institutions in other countries.

As of 2010, NAFSA h a d s e r v e d approximately 10,000 educators worldwide, representing nearly 3,000 higher e d u c a t i o n institutions.



The Rwandan High Commissioner to Nigeria, His Excellency, Ambassador Stanislas Kamanzi, has charged youths in the continent to ensure that they become the opposing force to any negative influences that can lead to the breakdown of order, as the world marked the 24th anniversary of the 1994 Rwanda genocide, where over a million Rwandan Tutsis and moderate Hutus were brutally murdered.



mbassador Kamanzi made the call during a symposium organized by the United Nations Information Centre, Lagos, the Rwandan High Commission in Lagos, and Covenant University in

commemoration of the Rwandan massacre, with the theme '2018 International Day of Reflection on the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsis in Rwanda'.

The Rwandan diplomat noted that those who died during the one hundred-day pogrom were mostly women, infants and youths. He urged the youths to endeavor to comprehend more about the ideology of genocide and fight it unreservedly. According to him, "As you shape your character through formal and informal education, you must stand against those wrongs, even if this may involve saerifice".

Ambassador Kamanzi stated that instead of striving to tap the capability and power of their people to foster development, the older generations of African leaders made the horrendous mistake of subjecting people of the African continent to cruelty.

He told the gathering that the people of Rwanda and Africa as a whole look forward to more synergies in advancing the fight against genocide and its ideology, so that the ever professed and broken "Never Again" promise can become a reality.

In his keynote address, a former United Nations Prosecutor, Barrister Segun Jegedc, who spoke on the theme, '*The Rwandan Genocide: What Went Wrong and How to Ensure Never Again*', said that the gathering could not have been held at a more auspicious moment in the collective history of human existence, coming at the end of arguably the most conflict prone century in human history.

Barrister Jegede noted with sadness how colonialism contributed in instituting a system that ended up promoting genocide. According to him, the labeling of a people that were hitherto of one language and culture, helped to create a chasm that led to the massacre.

The former prosecutor noted that since the unfortunate events in Rwanda, the international community has continuously showed lack of real commitment towards stemming massacres. He averred that despite the platitude of 'Never Again,' genocide have recurred in epic proportions in Darfur (Sudan) and the Central African Republic. He noted that as usual, the responses from the United States and other major world powers was non-committal and unhelpful rhetoric.

While noting that Sub-Saharan Africa is home to some of the world's most corrupt and ethnically fragmented nations, and the pattern discernible in previous cases of genocide showing strong correlation between ethnicity and genocide, Barrister Jegede posited that there is an ever present element to trigger genocide in Sub-Saharan Africa than in any other region of the world. He advised African countries to guard against a repetition of the Rwandan experience by legislating against ethnic classification and return their various countries to the pre-colonial era when there was no ethnic grouping or distinction.

In his message to the gathering, the United Nations Secretary General, António Guterres, who was represented by the National Information Officer, United Nations Information Centre, Lagos, Dr. Oluseyi Soremekun, said that the 1994 genocide was at variance with certain aspects of the UN Charter on Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adding that it was important that the international community constantly reflect on this to ensure that the dastardly act does not happen again anywhere in the world.

Mr. Guterres highlighted the need to ensure that Article 1, 3, 4, 5 and 9 of the Charter on Universal Declaration of Human Rights become

enshrined in the hearts of all towards ensuring that the 'Never Again' mantra is upheld and maintained.


Earlier in his welcome remarks, the Vice-Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor A.A.A. Atayero, represented by the Head, Department of Political Science and International Relations, Dr. Oluyemi Fayomi, said that the compelling vision of Covenant has been to raise a new generation of leaders for the African continent that would go out and preach inclusive governance instead of divisions.

Professor Atayero stated that it was with optimism that the University community and Nigerians hope that the symposium would be stimulating and thought-provoking towards ensuring that war, ethnic cleansing or genocide, never happens under our watch.

During the interactive session, a former Vice-Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor Charles Ayo, said that it was time that Africans use the continent's past to shape the present towards a future that we so desire. He noted that the labels of ethnicity and tribalism should be jettisoned if the world must truly say never again. According to him, "Nigeria cannot afford to go the direction Rwanda went."

The Head, Department of Languages and General Studies, Dr. Tuesday Owoeye, noted that the success story of Rwanda after the genocide was predicated on the quality and resolute leadership displayed by President Paul Kagame, by promoting oneness, nationalism, and patriotism, which are what other polarized nations need, to ensure that bloodbath and genocide is averted.

The event attracted faculty, staff, and students of Covenant University, students from the National Open University of Nigeria (NOUN), members of the public and the media.




utism is a developmental disorder characterized by social interaction and communication problems and also repetitive behavior. It is

characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and non verbal communication. Autism's most obvious signs tend to appear at the age of 3. It can be diagnosed as early as 18 months.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW IF YOU HAVE AN AUTISIC SIBLING

• THE GREATEST CHALLENGE; WHAT WOULD PEOPLE SAY? Parents worry about that, also siblings. The world is a place full of people who would either accept you or treat you like an outcast. Not everyone would



understand. You would find yourself, trying to pull your brother or sister out of your plans because he might have a tantrum or make strange noises. Some of us are embarrassed and keep our siblings in hiding because of the stigma associated with autism. The truth is that people would always have a thing to say, good or bad. Get ready for side-talks, taunting with awful words and hurtful gestures. Get ready to lose some friends, very important.

• **RESPONSIBILITY.** After the parents, you're next. One of my greatest fears is the



realization that I will be in charge of my brother after my parents are gone, or rather old. Just thinking of it might scare you. You would have to learn a lot of things concerning your sibling, things you never thought you would care about. It might come with a lot of problems but your sibling is a priority.

• **GET READY FOR SACRIFICES.** You may need something and it may be replaced with your brother's needs – things that have to do with therapy, educative games and other stuffs. You'll pretty much say "It's not fair" all the time.

• **MISUNDERSTANDING.** One of the things to deal with is the area of understanding, what he means or says or gestures. We need to learn that people living with ASD process information differently. A change of routine might send them to an edge. And guess what? They are actually very smart, so much so that they know what's supposed to happen every single day. Routine check, that's what I call it, He won't understand why you're going to the market after picking him up from school, he expects to be home. He won't understand a lot on body language and facial expressions.

• LET HIM HAVE HIS ALONE TIME. He just wants to be alone. Yes, it happens. Everyone needs a moment to just think and be alone. While growing up, my brother won't play with me. I force myself into his equation sometimes but it ends up badly.

• **CONTROL YOURSELF:** Words leave scars, there are good and bad types of scars. There are some times that he would annoy you to the point of uttering hurtful words. I've been there. Not just words but also actions. Yes, he would be provoking. He would do slightly insane things. The key is to take it easy and caution him the right way.

• WELCOME HIS WEIRDNESS. Humans have something weird about them. You have an amazing sibling, despite his weirdness. He would make weird noises, act irrationally. He would exhibit stuffs like "self-injury, head banging, self-biting. The thing is that you shouldn't be embarrassed (It will be) But just embrace it.

One important thing, Autism is not a spiritual issue, I repeat it **AUTISM. IS. NOT. A. SPIRITUAL. ISSUE.** Spending months in the church, screaming "die, die," won't solve a thing until you truly understand your child or sibling. I get, people have different ways of dealing with problems. Autism is everywhere and we should know more about it. HEALTH TIPS

reast cancer is the commonest cancer among women. It is diagnosed during a physical exam, by self-examination of

the breast, mammography or ultra sound testing.

What are the breast cancer risk factors?

Below are some risk factors. Age: the chances of breast cancer increase as one gets older.

Family history: the risk of breast cancer is higher among women who have relatives with the disease. Having a close relative with the disease (mother, sister) doubles the risk.

Personal history: Being diagnosed with breast cancer in one breast increases the risk of cancer in the other breast or the chance of additional cancer in the original

breast.

Exposure to previous chest radiation like X-ray increases the risk of breast cancer.

Using combines hormone therapy after menopause increases the risk of breast cancer.

SYSMPTOMS AND SIGNS OF BREAST CANCER

Breast cancer symptoms and signs include:

- A lump and pain in the breast or armpit that does not change even after the monthly cycle.
- Redness of the skin of the breast, like the skin of an orange.
- Bloody nipple discharge.
- Inverted nipple.
- Breast pain or sore nipple.
- Peeling, flaking or scaling of the skin on the breast or nipple.
- Swollen lymph nodes in the neck or armpit.

Warning Signs

• Waves of sharp pain that start in your back and side, and move toward the groin or testicles.

• Inability to find a comfortable position. People with kidney stones often pace the floor.

- Nausea and vomiting with ongoing flank pain.
- Blood in the urine.

• The frequent urge to urinate. Sometimes an infection is also present, and may cause these additional symptoms:

Causes

2. It's Not Just the Oxalate. Eat and drink calcium and oxalate-rich foods together during a meal.

5. EMERGENCY AUTO TRANSFUSION SYSTEM




EXCURSION All work and no play














Mass Comm Town and Gown Series



Stream: what would you like to achieve before the end of the year?


Emmanuel: I think two things actually: one will be to get a major feature on an internationally recognised platform like Vogue magazine. Personally I'm also

How Long Have You Been Playing the Saxophone?



Covenant University Urges Authors to Embrace Ethics in Research



he Covenant University M a n a g e m e n t h a s encouraged authors within and outside the institution to

be ethical in the conduct of their research, as they can't do quality research without following the ethics.

The Vice-Chancellor, represented by the former Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Shalom Chinedu, gave the charge at a two-day training of Investigators and Covenant University Health Research Ethics Committee (CU H R E C) m e m b e r s o n responsible conduct of research/ investigators responsibilities and research monitoring, held at the University.

Tracing the genesis of CU HREC, he said that the importance of ethics in research had prompted the Covenant University Management to ensure that everyone in the University gets as much knowledge as possible on research ethics. The University, he noted, had always had a small committee on research ethics, which was fully registered by the National Health Research Ethics Committee in 2016, when Covenant University became a place where authors

can apply and obtain certification for their research.

According to the Vice-Chancellor, the University had wanted to expand the CU HREC membership through the two-day training, and 34 of the 35 people nominated for the training attended in person.

The Chief Facilitator for the event was Professor Kolawole Oyedeji of the University of Lagos, and the other facilitator was a former Deputy Provost, University College Hospital and a faculty in the Department of Public Health, University of Ibadan, Professor Ademola Ajuwon.

Speaking on the aim and objectives of the training, Professor Oyedeji said that it was to build the capacity of workshop participants to understand how to conduct responsible research, and what monitoring of both social science and biomedical health The importance of ethics in research had prompted the Covenant University Management to ensure that everyone in the University gets as much knowledge as possible on research ethics.

He stated that at the end of the training, participants would have acquired knowledge and understanding on how to apply ethical principles in the responsible conduct of research in the design, implementation, and protection of research participants; acquire skills on how to address ethical considerations in social science and Genetic research.





Covenant Gains Global Prominence in the Field of Composite Coatings; **Electrodeposition; Nickel Matrix**



ovenant University made a very strong showing to occupy a prominent position in the list of the top 5 institutions worldwide, by scholarly output, in the field of Composite Coatings; Electrodeposition; Nickel Matrix. The University had 45 scholarly outputs, 664 views count, field-weighted citation impact of 0.73, and 108 citation count to rank 2nd on this topic.

The only institution to rank above Covenant, according to the computations by Elsevier's SciVal, the quick and easy access to the research performance of 8500 research institutions and 220 countries worldwide, was Tshwane University of Technology, which had 52 scholarly outputs, 746 views count, field-weighted citation impact of 0.69, and 146 citation count. Third in the list was Daging Petroleum Institute, with 41 scholarly outputs, 335 views count, field-weighted citation impact of 0.95, and 127 citation count.

According to the computations spanning the period between 2013 and 2018, the leading author on this topic at Covenant University, Professor CleophasLoto of the Department of Mechanical Engineering, was ranked among the top 100 authors globally. Professor Loto's research interests include Metallic Corrosion Reactions Phenomena, Electrodeposition and Electroless Coating of Metals, Structure/ Property Relationships, and Heat Treatment Phenomena.

Notably, the top two authors on this topic are Nigerians but currently of Tshwane University of Technology. Dr. Isaac Fayomi, a faculty at Covenant, was ranked 1st, courtesy of his 49 scholarly outputs, 779 views count, field-weighted citation impact of 0.73, and 146 citation count, while Professor Patricia Popoola, currently a visiting scholar at Covenant and ranked 2nd, had 46 scholarly outputs, 770 views count, field-weighted citation impact of 0.66, and 146 citation count.

The overall research performance on this topic worldwide was 862 scholarly outputs, 16, 342 views count, field-weighted citation impact of 0.90, and 3, 643 citation count.



According to her, the evolution of business management has led to the birthing of applied discipline field termed, 'Industrial and Organisational Psychology', which is also known as workplace psychology. 
problems, which will aid the HRM personnel maximise employee performance in furtherance of the management objectives, with the ultimate aim being to achieve organisational goals.

"Before you charge, first give the service. Add value to your client. Don't show desperation by pricing yourself too high or too low. Build integrity, let them trust you. Your attitude is very important. When they are able to trust you, they will look for you anytime they have challenge," he advised.

The Head, Department of Architecture, Dr. Oluwole Alagbe, had earlier remarked that the Town and Gown Seminar was always a time to share experience with experts as there was limit to what could be learnt in the classroom.

Also, the former HoD, Professor Albert Adeboye, in his closing remarks appreciated the guest speaker, who, he said, had exposed the participants to the business aspect of the profession in order to be a balanced Architect.


the ladder and pick up other struggling women," she stated.



Covenant University to be mindful of what they do, because their profession as Petroleum Engineers is very sensitive.

Dr. Osalusi, who is a Senior Metocean Engineer with Shell Nigeria Exploration and Production Company (SNEPCO), Nigeria, gave the charge on Thursday, February 15, 2018, at the Town and Gown seminar of the Department of Petroleum Engineering, where he delivered a lecture on the topic, 'Directional Metocean Criteria for Mooring and Structural Design of Floating Offshore structures'.

Stating that the term Metocean was derived from the words Meteorological and Oceanographic, the Guest Speaker defined it as a discipline covering meteorology and physical oceanography and is concerned with quantifying the impact and effect of weather and sea conditions on a wide range of activities in the onshore and



"Under Meteorology, we have winds, air temperature, air pressure, humidity, precipitation, superstructure icing, cloud cover/height, visibility, and daylight hours, while under Oceanography, we have waves, current, sea temperature, salinity, tide and water level, storm surge, sea ice, sea spray icing, icebergs, sediment transport," he said.

Explaining the need for metocean engineering, Dr. Osalusi said that the structural failure of the Sea Gem rig in December 1965, with the loss of thirteen lives, was a wake-up call for an improved understanding of the Southern North Sea environment. He stressed that as the fledgling North Sea offshore industry moved into deeper and more exposed waters of the Northern North Sea, demand for marine meteorological and oceanographic information grew, leading to the emergence of engineering meteorology and oceanography as an important offshore industry discipline.

He pointed out that the roles of

Metocean in the offshore industry, include the provision of optimal/suitable and innovative metocean solutions and guidance for offshore/onshore projects. These are extreme design criteria for ultimate strength; fatigue criteria; operational criteria for construction/tow/installation; meteorological and oceanographic instrumentation and measurement systems; weather and ocean modeling and forecasting; renewable ocean/wind energy among others.

According to Dr. Osalusi, who is a member of the Institute of Marine Engineering, Science and Technology, United Kingdom, cross-discipline awareness, early interaction, and appropriate time and budget for deliverables are notable challenges in metocean engineering. However, a closer working interaction between metocean engineers and metocean users add more value, he added.

Also, the guest speaker, while speaking on Directional Metocean Extremes and Failure Modes, said that there are two types of turbulence in metocean engineering, which are Oceanic turbulence and Atmospheric turbulence.

He further stated that the North Sea had witnessed multiple mooring line failures incidences between 1981 and 2011 and had cost an estimated US\$1.8billion to reinstate. "It's important, therefore, to ensure that design methodology assumptions are correct, reflecting worse-case scenarios," he warned.

Dr. Osalusi revealed that he was in Covenant University to share knowledge with the students and see how the University and SNEPCO can collaborate. He said it was discovered that universities do a lot of research but don't really know how things work offshore.

Prior to the lecture, the Head, Department of Petroleum Engineering, Professor David Orodu, appreciated the guest speaker for coming to Covenant University to share his wealth of experience with the students. He urged the students to pay attention and ensure that they make the most of the lessons learned from the lecture.

Also at the Town and Gown seminar were faculty and staff of the Petroleum Engineering Department.



'Chief Nike' as she is fondly called is the founder of Nike's gallery, the largest in West Africa. She is an artist and textile designer known for her *batik* weaving and dyeing workshops. Yinka Shonibare





The finals involved 32 teams, of which 31 came through qualifying competitions, while the host nation qualified automatically. Of the 32 teams, 20 had also appeared in the last tournament in 2014, while both Iceland and Panama made their first appearances at a FIFA World Cup. A total of 64 matches were played in


12 venues across 11 cities

FRANCE: Champions of the world

The 15th of July, 2018 was a date when football lovers and none football lovers in Russia and outside Russia were glued to their screens in anticipation of the country that would be crowed the Champions of the World in terms of football.

The battle was between a one-time World cup winner, France and Croatia, a team making its first final in the history of the tournament. Both teams had defeated former World Cup champions on their way to the final: France defeated Uruguay, while Croatia defeated England.

Argentina, a two-time winner of the tournament was defeated by both teams. Croatia became the third Eastern European nation to reach the World Cup final, and the first since Czechoslovakia lost the final in 1962 to Brazil.

France won the match 4–2, having taken a 2–1 lead during the first half on an own goal and penalty awarded by the video assistant referee (VAR) in the system's first use at a World Cup final. It was also the first time that an own goal had been scored in a World Cup final.

France also became the second team in the 32-team World Cup to win all their knockout matches without any extra time or penalty shoot-out after Brazil in 2002.

As winners, France qualified for the 2021 FIFA ConfederationsCup.



FIFA WORLD CUP 2018 AWARDS

FIFA announced a number of awards to recognise the great performances throughout their time in Russia including Golden Boot, Golden Ball, Golden Glove, Young Player and Fair Play Awards. Luka Modric, Kylian Mbappe, Harry Kane and Thibaut Courtois all received awards for their respective achievements at the 2018 World Cup during the presentation ceremony following the final at the Luzhniki Stadium in Moscow, Russia. France manager Didier Deschamps became only the third man to have won the World Cup as a captain and as a manager.

The facility will be available for both indoor and outdoor games including track and field, football, basketball, lawn tennis, swimming, volley ball, squash, badminton will be featured regularly.


