


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
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Stream Magazine is going 112 places!

Covenant University, on the heels of Harvard, plans 5 massive projects

Age difference not withstanding, the management of Covenant University is driving home the point that the institution is on the heel of the world's famous citadel, Harvard University. Five major projects, which observers say, will put it on the world radar of excellence are in the pipeline. These include the construction of Information and Communication Technology Center (ITC) which is going to be a place for research and built at a whopping N900 million; Centre for Leadership Development (CLD) costing N240 million and Centre for Entrepreneurial Development (CED) to be put up at a cost of N205 million. Others are Centre for Technological Advancement (CTA) to cost N350 million and the International Centre for Biotechnology (ICT) coming up at N270 million. Investigations have shown that no university in Nigeria has ever taken such a comprehensive initiative to move to the next level. The chancellor of the four-year old university was reported as saying in a meeting with the faculty and staff recently that there was no going back on the restoration of the dignity of the black race and that Covenant University was the instrument in achieving this. Observers are taking

keen interest in all these projects, especially CTA which will be a solution provision centre for the technological challenges and needs of the people. Already some companies have indicated interest in funding some of these projects.


International Conference on Mathematics

The vision of Covenant University which incorporates the statement; 'Departing from mathematics to lifematics, from knowledge to empowerment...' is finding fulfillment within the first four years of the institution as the university hosted the first ever international conference on New Trends In The Mathematical And Computer Sciences With Application To Real World Problems. This trail blazing event, held at the centre for learning resources, had in attendance scientists from both within and outside the country. They include; Professor Wayne Patterson from Howard University, Washington DC, USA; Professor Witold Zkarwowski, from university of Opole Opole, Poland; Professor Stig Larson, from Chalmers university of technology Goteborg, Sweden; Professor Jan Van Berg from Erasmus University, Rotterdam, The Netherlands; Professor Arun Sood from Geoge Mason university, Fairfax, USA; Professor Franz Kappel from Graz, Australia; Femi Taiwo from Obefemi Awolowo university and Profesor H. O. Tejumola from university of Ibadan.

One of the speakers, Mr Wayne, a professor of computer science, in one of his lectures on data Mining And Warehousing, Theory And Application, stresses that though data mining is quite a new subject in computer science, it has to do with being able to extract from very large data bases, information that may be hard to analyze by just looking at the data. And this requires series of techniques and tactics to be able identify the relationships between data. Adding that, the program will also help in the area of health data, geography and census among others.

Dr. Sikiru Adigun Sani, a participant from the University of Uyo says some of the teachings are abstract for now but with time they will be applied to real world problems. He however adds that the presentations are very inspiring and innovative, and therefore urge the Nigerian government to come close to mathematicians so they can apply some of these principles to tackling the numerous problems that the country is facing, especially corruption.

Dr. C.K. Ayo, a member of the organizing committee remarks that the proposed electronic voting system (but which was rejected at the senate) is not appropriate, as no country in the world has ever conducted e-voting with foreign technology. Therefore Nigerians have to look inwards and come up with indigenous technology with which to solve indigenous problems, hence the need for the very first international conference on New



Trends in the Mathematical and Computer Science with Application to Real World Problems, he adds.

10 chemicals that can change Nigeria's destiny

Dr. Josiah Olatunde Bello, a professor of chemical engineering in the College of Science and Technology enlightened Nigerians on how they have been cheating on their destiny by importing some industrial chemicals that can easily be produced in Nigeria. Six of them: Furfural, Hydrated Lime, Castor Oil derivatives, Tantalum/Niobium, papain and sawdust. Even sawdust!

The June 28, 2006 lecture drew a crowd who was told that furfural could be used as a solvent in petrol chemical refining and in mixture with other chemicals was useful in making fiberglass, some aircraft components and automotive brakes. Lime is used in steel manufacturing, mining and glass production and in fact it is used directly or indirectly in the manufacture of virtually every consumer or industrial product.

Castor oil is used for drug preparation and aircraft engine lubrication. Papain, which is extracted by a bioengineering technique from pawpaw, is widely used in food industry, cosmetic, medical and forage industries. Niobum is used in the manufacture of sophisticated electronic components, likewise tantalum.

And now sawdust! This material, which is actually a chemical is available in large quantities in Nigeria. Unfortunately, Nigerians are not doing much to maximize the benefits from this money spinner. This wood waste can be burned, fermented to make methane, methanol or ethanol as well as used in bioreactors to produce industrial chemicals.

The professor made some recommendations which include establishment of small and medium scale industries to produce them where they are available in several states of the federation, who must implement applicable research designs. More importantly, the professor stressed, these chemicals can be produced in Covenant




University.

The workshop featured works by youngsters with ages ranging between nine and 16 years, exhibition contests, corporate inventions exhibitions and seminars.

The Six seminar topics are: The Role of Government in the Promotion of Inventions and Innovations in Nigeria, Young Persons and Inventions the Asian Experience,



Documentation and Management of Intellectual Property, Financing of Inventions and Innovations in Nigeria and Entrepreneurial Development in Nigeria: The Missing Link. The Vice Chancellor, Prof. Obayan, had during a public lecture, acknowledged the efforts of NAI's president Prince Momodu for the association's efforts towards Nigeria's technological development.

The exhibition, which was organized in association with the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology Abuja, featured many electrical/electronic and mechanical inventions and innovations.




CU dons off to South Africa

Society of Quality of Life Studies (of Rhodes University, Grahamstown) held from July 19 to 26, 2006.



The Making of Covenant University

The visioner and Chancellor of Covenant University, Dr. David Oyedepo addressed journalists recently to brief them on the developments in Covenant University. The press conference was part of the week-long activities leading to the first Convocation ceremony tagged "Release of Eagles" which took place on July 28, 2006.

The journalists present were amazed at the speed at which the university was being built as proofs were on ground to attest to the claims of the chancellor.

According to Dr. Oyedepo, Covenant University was established as a reaction to the prevalent decadence in the educational sector of the Nigeria and as a platform for change to make the country and the indeed the black race free from mental slavery which they have been subjected to over the years. Wrapped up in the vision is the divine mandate to raise a new generation of leaders through qualitative life-applicable education, value-based leadership and skill development, embedded in sound biblical principles to bring about reformation and restore the dignity of the black race.

He stressed that Covenant University was a leadership factory where a new generation of reformers, kings and queens were being born to "build the old waste", "repair the waste cities", and "raise the former desolations." The philosophical basis for this is contained in this motto: "Promoting Mental Productivity".

Besides the regular academic programmes, one of the novel ways of knowledge impartation at the university is the Total Man Concept or TMC, which is a core course that aims at making man complete intellectually, physically and

spiritually. The essence of the programme as a source of integrity and discipline is to prepare and equip students of Covenant University with the relevant life skills and mindset which will provide support as they confront the challenges of life. Entrepreneurial Development

Studies is another novel way of

learning at the university.

Progress is

constant

In the Chancellor's words: "we have an inbuilt Entrepreneurial Development studies (EDS), which makes learning not only pedagogical but practical and life- applicable as well as, practitioner-based. The focus is to inculcate in the students the spirit and discipline of enterprise and entrepreneurship." Similar programmes are now being taught in other universities, following the adoption of the Covenant University model by the National Universities Commission.

Towards a Total Graduate (TTG) is a final year programme students must pass to be eligible for graduation. The course is taught to prepare the intending graduand as a change agent not only for the nation but the

entire black race. Subjects taught include The World of Work, Dynamics of Economic Dignity, Success Concepts, Life Long Learninig, Principles of Integrity, Marriage and Family, and Total Quality Management.


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Covenant University How the eagles were released

Nove than 700 students received tieir degrees it the first ever gaduation c remonies of Covenant University tagged "The Release of Eagles" and held from July 24-28. 2006. This number represents those who successfully scaled through, not only in academics but also in other areas such as discipline, sacrifice, diligence and other core values of the university. Over 1,600 students started the journey four years ago. Those who started four years ago but are not graduating now include Environmental Sciences and Engineering students whose program tenure is five or six years and some other students who were sent away due to disciplinary measures.

The process of graduation in Covenant University has been universally acclaimed by students themselves, parents, faculties and

academic observers. The process is a departure from the usual practice of other universities where students are weighed mainly on academic scales, almost completely neglecting other areas.

Besides, the regular academic programmes, it is compulsory for students to pass Total Man Concept (TMC) and Entrepreneurship Development Studies (EDS) courses which are all geared towards making the student a total graduate. Covenant University is the only place in Nigeria where TMC courses are taught and some universities that now teach EDS courses took their bearing from Covenant University. Students are taught these courses from the first year to the last and they embrace the three aspects of man: spirit, soul and body. Beside class work, the outgoing

students were given the opportunity to practice what they have learnt and sometimes to do business in thee skills they have acquired. Part of this initiative was to send the students to various organizations for their industrial attachment. The various reports sent in by these organizations have attested to the fact that graduating students of Covenant University are indeed the world changers Nigeria and the world have been waiting for.

A crucial aspect is the spiritual. Part of what makes Covenant University different is that apart from being a private university, it's also a Christian university, where every thing is done in a Godlike manner. The university believes that it is improper to be intellectually good and spiritually lazy and that being strong in one's spirit man is a visa to

being sound academically or intellectually. This is the reason why students were given sound spiritual education which is basically that being close to God is the basis of achievement of destiny.



The final challenge on the road to graduation

The Chancellor of Covenant University, Dr. David.O.Oyedepo. initiated the TTG programme and it was borne out of his passion to restore the dignity of the black race. It was the last hurdle the intending graduate must scale before he or she could be eligible to graduate. The Chancellor designed the programme to further equip the students mentally and spiritually. The program commenced on May 29,2006 with two sessions between 8 and 10am and 8 and 10pm

Dr. Oyedepo took the students on dynamics of economy. The V.C lectured often times on morality while the Chaplain covered the faith arena. The graduating students said that they learnt a lot from the program.



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
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How we achieved graduation success

Can you briefly introduce yourself Sir?

My name is Prof Cyril Ajayi, I am a Professor of Estate management. I am presently on sabbatical from Obafemi Awolowo University. Well I started in November last year. But I still have accumulated leave of almost three years, which I hope to spend here.

Sir what are the things you put in place to ensure a hitch free Convocation ceremony?

Well, what we did essentially when the committee was inaugurated was to set up a budget and the budget ran up to over 30 million Naira. In most other public universities it's like they go cap in hand begging for funds, but at Covenant University it's a different story. To avoid lapses here and there, what we did was to set up ten subcommittees to handle different aspects of the Convocation ceremony. These subcommittees report directly to me and I report directly to the Vice Chancellor. We wrote letters to well meaning Nigerians and I am happy to say that we are getting feedbacks from them by way of goodwill messages, which are very, very inspiring. The University approved NTA live coverage. We are going to have launching of developmental projects on campus, world press conference, we will be setting up alumni associations, Convocation parley, cultural night and so on. We are going to have convocation dinner and that will involve all the graduating students and their parents. We are also going to have Public Lectures, I think General Yakubu Gowon will be coming, we are also expecting Governor Donald Duke (sic) and also a prominent woman that has demonstrated visionary leadership, I have forgotten her name now. So all those are in place and during the actual ceremony itself, you see, there are some conventions that when you look at Convocation ceremonies in places like U.K Universities that they do, that Universities here don't do. So its like setting up a culture of convocation as

it is done elsewhere in the world and I can assure you that its going to be a glorious ceremony, that much I know, that people will come and say "ah, this is a convocation".

You talked about launching some programmes. Is this an avenue to generate money for the University?

Covenant University is not known for begging. By development project, I am talking about those that are going to be commissioned, like the restaurant, like the University guesthouses, which they are just building now. Hopefully they are going to complete them before the end of July .So such projects like that are going to be commissioned. It is just to show to the outside world the development that has taken place in the past four years.

Considering the large number of guests we are expecting that day, what accommodation arrangements did you put in place?

Well as you know there are few hotels in Ota but we do have an inventory of good accommodation. We have our

hospitality subcommittees that have gone round good hotels like Temperance hotel and Ogun State Gateway Hotel. We are not just going to put people just anywhere.

Is there any support coming from the corporate companies that do business with the University, I mean companies like Oceanic Bank e.t.c?

Well, let me just give you an example. Like four of us were out yesterday and we had designed some letters for some corporate organizations to be part of the event, in terms of maybe showcasing their products, in terms of making their products free to people, I mean Nestle for instance or Cadbury or Coca-Cola or Sona Breweries, they will come, they are definitely coming, we saw all of them yesterday, MTN, Globacom, IGI, they are all coming. They will probably come and display their products and those that involve consumption like Sona Breweries will probably open their tent for people to just come in and have free drinks. So we are hoping that they will come and add colour to the event.

Mr. Ukoha O.Igwe is the Acting Director of Centre for Learning Resources (University Library) of Covenant University. He graduated from Ahmadu Bello University (A.B.U), Zaria, Nigeria where he had a First Class Honors degree in Library & Information Science and Masters in Instructional Technology. His unusual passion for academics made him go back to A.B.U. Zaria in 1990 where he taught Information Technology and Information Organisation. He concentrated on the application of information and communications technology to information dissemination where he has distinguished himself.

He left Ahmadu Bello University for Nigerian Institute of Transport Technology as the Institute Librarian in 1999, where he stayed till 2002 when he joined the team at Covenant University. He is also a doctoral student in Library & Information Science, Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria.

He said one major achievement is the fact that there was no library when he came to the school but by God's grace, there is now a library, adding that he was one of the people who came up with the idea of the library with the chancellor, Bishop David Oyedepo.

Mr. Igwe said the university was working towards achieving the 100,000 volume of books target, adding that all courses that are being taught at the university would be taken care of library-wise. He remarked that the students are making good use of the library including the virtual one.

He further said that the current

projects are the purchase of more books, equipping the binding sections and a drive towards a fully computerized library.

In the next five to ten years, Dr. Igwe sees Covenant University library as the best in Africa, where people can always source information about their books worldwide, he sees the library to have implemented its full e-learning program like in Harvard library as well as a robust staff training.

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I grew up in a very strict family

An intimate chat with Nigeria's number one Vice-Chancellor

Impressive career, happy family and visionary leadership are just a few words to describe the life of Professor Aize Obayan, the Vice Chancellor of Covenant University. In 2005, she was voted the best university vice chancellor by the National Universities Commission (NUC). Under her leadership, the university that had 16 courses accredited at only one presentation, has moved to a level of global recognition, which has created a fresh hope for the future. In this exclusive interview with Prof. Obayan and her husband, you will learn how to be a success both at work and the home front.

Who is Professor Aize Obayan?

Professor Aize Obayan is just a lady who is seeking God's will; God's open door and working to be a contribution indeed to her world, as well as bringing meaning to the lives of other persons.

When did you realize that you wanted to be a 'contribution'?

I believe I grew up finding that really, and the more I tried to find out the purpose of my being, it became obvious. I remember my secondary school days. I was drawn to helping people and seeing bow I could put them on the right path. I wanted to make them happy. That was how it just started.

Tell us a bit about your background.

Well, I grew up in a very strict family. We were very close and still close. I also grew up as a first child, taking care of my younger ones at a very early age. Of course my parents were very busy people. There was a time when my dad was abroad and my mum had to be away from home, taking care of my younger brother in the hospital for a long time. I suddenly found



out that I was in charge of the household.

The decisions about what we would eat and so on fell on me even though we had a house help. So even right now, I find that I just want to take care of people. Like I said, my parents were very strict, and we grew up as children feeling that my growing was just too tough. But I believe looking back now; it helped us have a kind of focus and a structure. We were not allowed to have anybody come to visit us in the house; you don't take phone calls unless they knew who it was. You could be with the phone downstairs, and dad would be listening upstairs. We had a very protective, disciplined background. You couldn't even go for birthday parties. It was what we called "shelled life". And my friends would even ask me then, "is your

father gonna marry you?" In the University, he'd visit me at odd hours to make sure you are there, and everybody knew "Mr. Frank"

on campus. He even wanted to take me to NYSC camp but I said no! No father goes with his daughter to camp. I'll be the laughing stock". So he said "Oh! Are you rejecting your father?" I said "No"

. But I had my way, and I went to camp on my own. Thank God!(laughs)

For my Masters programme, he took me to school, and my Head of Department never stopped teasing me even until today; that I came to school with a feeding bottle in my mouth. That was hecause my father brought me to school, and handed me over to him. This was odd because, for your Masters, you'd expect that you go on your

own, and not with your father. But he was just doing his assignment, and playing the role of a father, and wanted to be part of every stage of my development.

I appreciate that because they (parents) gave us all we wanted, and supported our dreams and they were good models. They were successful in their careers, they carved out a niche for themselves, [and] they gave us a good message in the sense that "you must be the best that you can be and make sure that you leave a mark." I grew up knowing that. This is a legacy in the family you don't have an option but to improve on that. That sent warning signals that I couldn't afford to fail in whatever I do. That was the massage we grew hearing. My father would ask for my assignments late in the night after he came from work and God bless you if you've not done your Math assignment, and God bless you if you miss one! So that was the kind of background we had.

What did your father engage in?

My father was a Career Administrator. He retired as a permanent secretary. [Now] He's president of the Full Gospel Business Men's Fellowship in Benin where he stays.

Have you always known you wanted to be in academics?

Well, I didn't know that until my first year in the university.

With all the restrictions your father placed on you, and with your focus, how did you finally meet your husband?

I met him long before we met in a relationship. You know, his father was a lecturer at University of Ilorin where I was working. His father was also the Chaplain of the university and he had always been around. Coincidentally when we didn't know it, our parents had been in the university together and somehow, I knew I had heard the name before. With his father being a chaplain and his own spiritual background, once in a while he would come and give a message during the church service. Then his younger brother and my

younger sister were classmates, they both read medicine. So, he had always being around, it wasn't like we just met. We were always around the same circles because of my younger sister. Then of course later in the same fellowship and this was long after I left home, so really it wasn't in the same context of the restrictions anymore.



So who would you say your husband is?

My husband is cheerful, and always smiling. He's very cheerful, no baggage. He takes life very simple, no complications. He is not as fastidious about many things as I am. Everything is fine, everything is okay: that's his kind of person. He is also someone that loves God and takes the things of God very seriously.

How is it like being the VC coupled with your family responsibilities?

I see it as God's ordained assignment. I don't see it as many persons expect me to see it. And I just believe that life is a process and along that process, one is on a pathway and along that pathway, God would call you to different assignments because it is in progression and one particular stop gives you lessons and skills for the next stage. I always say one thing; it is not about the office. I don't have any hang ups about the office. It is more about the service and contributions I would be able to make and at this stage especially for the life of covenant University. It is about the foundation I am able to put in place. There's something about a pathway really, and this is about constructing it. You build up a pathway for others to follow. I've been privileged by the grace of God to set some things in place; things that would put the responsibilities on the right path for the future, for persons who would come five or ten years time; things that would make CU the leading university.

And the family?

It is having to really juggle. Because I am a person who would like to ensure that I am able to handle the two sides. It is very demanding in the sense that you are making sure that every thing is going well at home as much as possible and at work. Struggling between giving the children attention they need, and my husband. We are very free with one another, we are friends...

we don't have any of those restrictions that I had growing up. I felt it's not really the best in terms of psychological empowerment, even though I came out the best for it. As a young child I wasn't really able to discuss with my father, although I am free to do so now. I don't want this for my children. There is need for a psychological connection between the children and me. They are responsible and I give them the freedom to be in touch with themselves and bring out the best in them. My son Joshua helps in selecting the clothes I wear, right from the blouse, jacket, scarf and shoes. He is able to coordinate the colours well and I'm touched by his actions. I don't think he is doing it for the sake of doing it, I feel he had asked himself "I want to make mummy's life easy, what can I do?" I believe in future he would have something to do with women's clothing, may be have a boutique because he is so good at the way he puts them (clothes) together. When there are challenges at school, especially with my daughter Toluwani, I am very frank with her. I tell her what it is and how I coped with such things and why she must be focused. I give her reasons to be focused and do not just say don't get involved with someone.

My husband is very supportive, virtually giving me the space to be the woman that I have to be, no demands of 'you must cook my food' because I can't always cook the food, but over Christmas and holidays, I try to at least get into the kitchen, but I am not a kitchen person at all. The kitchen should be neat and I like to entertain when I have the time. I can't do anything that I am not passionate about. I am very fussy about things being done right, especially with the house being neat. And my husband may not like that side of me



because he is someone who may like things just kept anywhere. Those are the things we've had to juggle. We've been married since 1989 and I believed we have coped well.

Your home is really beautiful and I can see you're a really good home-keeper. Who is in charge. Or is it Joshua?

(Laughs) well, you can ask my husband. Although I have always liked things to be done properly and colour coordination made right.

I'm sure you're a mentor to women right now. So what does it take to be a good woman, and what should young ladies be doing at this time in their lives? What should they be thinking of?

Well, 'good' as a word is very relative. I believe it depends on what they want to see themselves excelling in. I think that would be a personal thing. I think it's about finding your path and finding your ground, and then just being the best there. What I desire for women in Nigeria is that [they] should be in touch with themselves, and break out from obscurity and take centrestage. Many women have a lot to offer, but they have not been socialized in that direction. I see basically a woman as an advantage in the sense that women have been created by God to play a biological role, and also be contributors, but many women get stuck at just the biological function and they do not look at other aspects of their being. You see the life of Esther being wife to the king, but being also the person that God used to save her people. There [are] the Deborahs of this world, and there are other women, but the Esther story always challenges me; and then you look at the woman in Proverbs 31. Many people that get stuck in the traditional role of womanhood have not seriously connected with the Proverbs 31 woman, who in this context would be a superwoman indeed! As an industrialist she's there, as a home-keeper she's there, in terms of really pushing her husband, in terms of giving him a presence she's there and that is not a traditional female role; so, persons need to be connected with that.

Finally, what's your advice for the CU youth, who doesn't understand the privilege he or she has being here?

I believe when people know their purpose in life then everything falls in place. When you're not sure of wbat you've been called to do, that creates problem. If you know that God has called [you] to take over as King or Queen, then it is only royal things you would think about. So when persons know the reasons for their creation, they understand the purpose, they have a vision. Thank God for TMC! Many youth who don't know that before now have the privilege of hearing that for the first time, and can define their paths. It's about self-

discovery really; once that is clear I believe everything else falls in place.

Well, I'm Adetokunbo Uche Chimaya [Obayan]. But most people call me 'Toks' for short.


Where did you get the Igbo name from?

My mother is Igbo. She comes from Abia State

How did you meet your wife?

A number of things happened. One, we left the university about the same year (but different universities), and then she came to Ilorin, which is where my family had lived since 1969 (but honestly I don't think I've been there for quite some time myself). She came there for her Masters, and then for her doctorate. Her younger sister and my junior brother were classmates. Initially we didn't know, but our parents were classmates too. When I came into town, I remember my first time of seeing her; I observed her, and I said, "she looks like a very intelligent lady" for intelligence has always been more important than looks for me. If I am to stay with somebody for a long period of time, then we must have interesting conversations. When she hecame a Christian, we became pretty good friends, and then one thing led to another. She was lecturing at the university then; I was running an engineering consultancy firm with two of my friends also in Ilorin. She started coming to the Full Gospel Business Men's meetings, and I was secretary of the Ilorin chapter and one thing led to another, and we decided to get married! She always says I didn't propose to her! I think I did...I just didn't say it in the normal direct way. We got married in 1989.

One thing that always impressed me about her is that we could always talk; we could always discuss issues. She had a depth that you don't find [among other women]. Not because they don't have the capacity, but because many of them have not been socialized. Many girls don't discuss some things. I am not being gender stereotypical; I'm just observing things! Probably, society has not encouraged them to exercise and express their intellect. She doesn't have that hang-up. When you also come from a home like mine, you don't expect women





Yes, I was 1 but not because of the position. Position has never really mattered to me much. I was in the vehicle with somebody a few days ago, and we were talking on the presidency of Nigeria, and he said to me, "how many people would want to be president of Nigeria?" I said, "I would!"

He looked at me... I said it's not about the perks of office or the strings...

I said how many people in Nigeria have the opportunity to impact this nation the way the president has. Every speech of the president affects many peoples' lives. For such an opportunity, I would be ready to take it and if I lost my life in the process, that would be a privilege. So for me, my attitude, especially when she became VC, was that this was the opportunity for her to do the things she's always dreamt of doing; to be what she's always wanted to be, and to be part of what is happening in Covenant University. I tell people I'm an advocate of the Covenant University dream. Before CU started, I was already talking to people about my dream for education in Nigeria. I even had that advantage of pulling off things...because my dad had a doctorate in education management, and was Permanent Secretary (education) and as a university student I sat on one of the major education committees then in 1977. They accomplished a lot together especially in climbing academic ladders.

What's your advice for the youth?

For young people, my own fundamental idea is that many young people in this new

What are your hobbies, sir?


I play the guitar. I sing, write songs, tell the story of the songs, and write articles.

Dr. Rotimi is not just the dean of students. He is the anchorman of students' law enforcement. Read from the man whose strategy is succeeding.

Can you briefly introduce yourself Sir

I am Dr. Daniel Rotimi, the Dean of Student Affairs, Covenant University. I [also] pastor with the Living Faith church.

What has the experience been like since you assumed the position of Dean of Student

Well, very challenging and thank God for grace. Quite a number of rough times: decisions that you have to take, which you must take of necessity because it is better to offend man rather than to offend God and it is my own disposition that I will rather offend man rather than offend God. With that in mind, I ensure that as much as possible, transparency is usually the watch word

Would you say there has been an improvement in student discipline since you assumed office?

Yes I would say that. While I came I saw quite a number of them flouting the most common [rule], which is the dress code. You [could] see some students still "sagging" both their trousers and their ties and you see some female students too dressing lackadaisically, almost exposing their bodies. So these are the issues that we looked into and I believed that God helped us to at least be able to correct these.

By next session, there will be another set of matriculating students, how will the Students Affairs department handle the large number of students that are being expected next session?

Well, for every new intake that we have in every session, there is a match-up in terms of manpower demand. So the students that are coming in, I believe that they will be taken

What is the strategic plan of the Student Affairs department for the next five years?

Well in the next five years, one sees Covenant University as being indeed a model, a model for all to see, a model University and indeed the students of Covenant University, we see them as being Queens and Kings indeed. Naturally we expect that in five years time Covenant University students will indeed be leaders, leaders in their own right, leaders in their own respect. Now we are turning out the first set of graduates from Covenant University. In the next five years we expect them to have at least risen to an appreciable level where you will to able to at least vouch that Covenant University is making an inroad into changing the society, so our aim is to indeed birth a change in the system, so if we are birthing a change, you can't give what you don't have, therefore if you must be a world changer, you yourself must of necessity be changed. 

In an interview with the Dean of CST, Professor Ekundayo Adeyinka Adeyemi, a picture was painted of CST's future.


Professor Adeyemi stated that

weighed before this can be put in place.



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Transform your mind

Professor Charles Ogbulogo, the Dean of Covenant University's College of Human Development is an academic who never fails to bare his mind at any given opportunity or forum. It would be recalled that during his English Public Lecture which was held in 2005, Professor Ogbulogo, while churning out some mistakes normally made by some English language speakers, brought out some grammatical errors in the past speeches of the Chancellor, Bishop David Oyedepo and other principal officers of the institution while they were all present at the lecture.

In an exclusive chat with Stream Magazine recently, Professor Ogbulogo said that one of the things that make the College of Human Development unique is that its courses are tailored towards making its graduate employers of labour rather than job seekers or employees.

When asked about the reason for the limited number of first class students in the College of Human Development, he said it was not as easy as it is elsewhere to make a first class in humanities because the College offers are more of expressive courses. According to him, "We go beyond the logic to talk about the aesthetic domain of that logic, in other courses it is easy when you do some calculations to have straightforward answers and straight A's but in the humanities we drill out the best in man and because of the nature of man, we are able to grind, it becomes very difficult to parade first class degrees in humanity." He quickly added that this is not say that excellence is not rewarded, saying if one truly deserves a first class, he or she is not denied it.

It is not uncommon to see students of the College of Human Development especially the Mass Communication students complain of heavy course workload and assignments. STREAM Newspaper asked the Dean why this was so but the Dean immediately dismissed this perception saying: "The highest graduation credit

unit requirement in the College of Human Development is that of the Mass Communication Programme which is about 171 units, in Sociology its about 158 but compare that with Architecture in the College of Science and Technology which is almost 200. In the basic sciences it is about 200 plus and in the College of Business Studies, its close to 200 so I do not think it's a very gentle expression that we carry more workload".

On the notion that some courses offered in the College are not professional, Professor Ogbulogo says that perception is unfortunate. According to him, "Parents and students don't understand the place of the humanities in National development. The situation appears to be that people are more likely to go for the so-called professional courses and the reason behind the interest is just to guarantee immediate cash and employment. What we do in the humanities is to re engineer the human mind and African development is only possible when we have a well defined human mind. The National Policy on Education says the ratio of science based courses Vis a Vis the humanities should be 60:40 and we are not likely to upturn

To illustrate the role of the humanities in national development the Dean used the Independent nation of Singapore as a case study. The tiny former British colony got her independence in 1965. According to the Professor, "Singapore was virtually part of Malaysia especially after independence from Britain. Singapore is landlocked; the only thing going for Singapore then was a small port, which was like a transitional port for British citizens but all that has changed. From 1965 till now, its just 41 years, Singapore is now a first world country because of the ingenuity of their first Prime Minister, Lee Kwan Yoo who discovered the essence of humanities and education and he didn't waste time. That is what we call transformation of the mind".

On the capability of the College to handle student intake during the coming 2006/2007 session, the Dean assured that staff capability would not be a problem. He says, "This year we are expecting a rise in student intake but that's not a problem. The College services all other programmes so our staff are on the ground in fact we have a Professor joining us in Public Relations, we also have two lecturers joining in Mass Communication, one of them has a PhD while the other one has a first class degree from the University of Nigeria. We also have another lecturer joining us in Sociology who also has a PhD. It will also be good for you to know that we would be having a Professor from London joining us very soon. He is from the School of African Oriental Studies in London and he will be coming to handle Literature. In the area of Counseling people have applied and we are still processing them, you know its not just easy to join ranks here, what we do here is beyond the call of duty, the average staff here has to understand our core values".

On why the intake for English Language programme is usually low each session, Professor Ogbulogo says, "The quota for English Language programme has not always been met but we understand that it takes time. I had all my degrees in English Language and I thank God I went through that process. I had the opportunity of specializing in Political Science and my parents and friends believed that would have been more profitable but I knew what I wanted".

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
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Industrial Visit



Thank you sir. A very important issue that is much talked about in the University now is that of the Endowment Program. What is Endowment program all about?

> (laugh) Yeah, as you can see, with every individual on the surface of the earth, with organization that is doing well, and for every nation that is forging ahead, something has been endowed. So we are talking about building a capacity for this continent. What are universities meant to be? A university is suppose to be a factory of knowledge. If you are planting maize, you can look for a corn that will incur high demand. If you want to harvest yam, you are looking for an investment of a year. If your intention is to plant seeds, then you must be well ready to invest heavily on it. Because of the gestation period of knowledge, and because of the dynamic circumstances that surround education, we can't but create a path for human development. You are not talking about cash and carry, and if you are going to do research, cash and carry nobody will buy. If you are going to talk about a knowledge that will change the people, eh., it is not available just by the way. So every new university that has a vision cannot survive by just the fees that are paid no matter how fat, Harvard is a private university, so you see you have to invest in knowledge and the investment in knowledge does not come immediately. A university is a capital intensive project and you discover that nations that have made it, they got a rich harvest in research methodology. But that is the concept that is not clear, that is the environment that is not planned, that is the portion we have not seen in this part of the world, talking

about Africa. And now God brought Covenant University, and He has shown us the way to go about it and now we have a very solid foundation. All of the infrastructures here were built without borrowing from anywhere, God built it. All we have discovered for us here is that God has built us a launching pad and we are set to fly, so we are asking anybody that cares, we are saying those of us, both individuals and organizations who have seen what God has done and who have

As the Registrar, what is the essence of packaging TTG (Towards a Total Graduate) program for the graduating

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

This statement was made by the Corporate and Public Affairs officer of the Covenant University, Deacon Segun Olanipekun, during a chat with Stream, in his office.

When asked about what the outcome of the students will be after their graduation, knowing fully well that they have being brought up in Christian way and the world consists of people of diverse religion, his response was that the principles of Jesus were applicable to all facets of life, while the person of Jesus Christ involved bringing the person to accept the faith.

Wireless environment is imminent-Pastor Mike Ogbolu-Chi

May we meet you sir.

I am Pastor Mike, a missionary and the acting director of the Centre for Systems and Information Services (CSIS), Covenant University.

What exactly is the relevance of the CSIS to our CU community?

Basically, the CSIS is the arm responsible for ensuring that the entire university is right on the cutting edge of technology. We administer all the IT requirements of the school from computer-enabled laboratories to cyber cafés for staff and students. There is also the Data Centre which is in itself a mini unit on its own as it manages all the university data such as students' result, registration data and so on.

And to what extent can one say that the CU community has been placed right on that cutting edge?

We have actually moved from the cutting edge to the bleeding edge. And right now I can tell you we are on the leading edge of technology. We have taken definite steps towards this feat.

What are these steps to show as proof that CU is really on the bleeding edge of technology?

Okay! Imagine now that Covenant University is one of the few universities that can boast of a 250-computer laboratory all for students use and they are state-of-the-art computers with full configuration. There are also about a 100 computer units with the laboratories in the Social Sciences. So if you look at the total carriage capacity in terms of computers right here in CU, it is well over 600. And where you have these 600 computers fully networked, it is quite a large network.

In terms of infrastructure, we are connected to the Internet via V-SAT so we don't go through any Internet service

provider. Also the colleges are connected by fibre-optic means and that is about the best connection means. In the telecommunications department, we have well over 700 telephone extensions interconnected and in current use on the campus.

That means we can boldly claim that Covenant University is a viable partaker of the new communication age.

Yes, we are. Virtually all the devises I use Cont'd on pg. 45

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

here are current and IT-enabled and we expand daily.

Coming back to you as a person, what challenges have you faced in the course of this job?

What you see as challenges are not challenges to me, rather I view them as opportunities. This is because when something stands in my way, I see it as an opportunity to overcome; so you simply take hold of them and make the best out of it. There is always a way out of every constraint, that's the way we operate here. No matter what the budget is, how streamlined it is, if you can think enough, you will always keep moving.

A pastor, missionary, computer expert, choir praise leader... How do you manage to juggle all these tasks together and keep healthy?

It is very simple you know. There is a saying that those who fail to plan, plan to fail. It requires planning, so I engage a lot planning. And then I give little extra time to my assignments so I don't lose out on normal time. We have a good example in the chancellor, Bishop David Oyedepo, he works longer than everyone on this campus, so we are simply following the footsteps of a leader.


We have situations in which some students' results require certain rectification [in their scores]; it is always a sort of difficult long process due to some form bureaucracy, what is being done to address this red tape?

Ok. I will tell you that it is not really that there is a long process in addressing the issue of result rectification; rather it becomes long when you don't follow the due process. I usually say to people that hard work is the easy work we did not do at the right time. So when you see the process as long, that means you haven't followed the due process. When your results are ready, we publish them and ask you to react. Once you have a complaint, you simply go through your Head of Department who attests to the fact that there should be a change and appends his signature, same way the Dean of your College. However, we discover that if you circumvent that process and simply write a letter to the CSIS, there is no way we are going to resolve that because the problem originates from the department, so we send it back. The CSIS is very strict in administering policies, and there are men ready on hand to attend to you once you have gone through the appropriate channels. There are no bottlenecks in the CSIS.

Pastor, most times students complain about the server being slow. What is being done to rectify this?

Talking about the speed, what has happened is that we are in the process of upgrading the bandwidth for our operations. The bandwidth we started out with when we had more than 50 computers is still what we have now for more than 600 computers. So if everyone is on the Internet at the same time, it is bound to be slow. So we have in process, plans to upgrade drastically so that before you even click, there is a jump on your systems. However, while that is in process, we are time slicing in the sense that we allocate time to different blocks and segments on campus so you can have enough bandwidths to operate with. So sometimes, you find that the cyber café closes at a particular time so we can allocate bandwidth to other units and you can enjoy

One other thing that the department does is it liaises with other external bodies that have

to the Covenant University Consultancy Services like the bakery, cafeteria, shopping mall, e.t.c. What I mean by that is that we are in charge of their account system; incomes and expenditures are done by us.

anything to do with the university by way of tax; you know payment of university levies, lecturer's taxes (pay as you earn); so, we deduct from these university worker's salaries and pay to the appropriate authorities on monthly basis. Then of course, we render accounts on annual basis; at the end of the financial year, we review the accounts of the university; the incomes and expenditures so as to know the status of the accounts. Even though this is not a profitmaking institution but then even within the family situation, you have a budget of how much comes in and goes out. So, the review is just for the university to know the financial situation for the university at the end of the financial year. One other thing that this department does is it oversees or it has an oversight responsibility

us the reasons for these continuous increase?

Private university education is expensive anywhere. The amount of investment that has gone into the university; there are payments for services, maintenance of hall residences, libraries, etc. The school fee isn't the commercial equivalent of what students utilize. But what I can tell you is that there hasn't been any pronouncement on the actual increase but there will certainly be an increase.

Judging from statistics, which we believe you are acquainted with, is the increase in school fees affecting the number of entries to the university?

available to student. E.g the Cafeteria mgt, Hebron water mgt, clinic mgt, physical planning department etc.





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
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Covenant University Week of Spiritual Emphasis

sometimes?



Paul: Eh, technically, I'm in a relationship, but practically distance has been a big problem. I'm in a relationship but it is not the way it should


be. But nevertheless I am trying to stay faithful; I'm training myself so that it could be true to myself.

It has also been found out that students don't come to chapel services with their Bibles. Such students have also been warned to comply with the rules and regulations of the school because coming to the chapel without the holy book and sermon jotter will make them qualify as absent from service.

Chapel defaulters can therefore earn themselves penalties ranging from suspension to expulsion, depending on the gravity of the offence.

recently to establish the fact that it is not difficult to identify church service absentees.


Students commend chaplaincy





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

Who is the person behind Shassy wears? He is Feyi Shassanya, a 300 level Architecture student from the College of Science and Technology (CST). I am more or less just someone that loves being creative. I've had this creativity thing in me ever since I was little.

How did you get the name Shassy? Shassy is actually my nickname; it's what people know me as, more like my corporate identity.

How long have you been in this business?

For three years now. I started before I came into CU.

So, who are your target consumers? My customers have been mainly guys

My customers have been mainly guys but the ladies were like 'we've seen some of the stuff you've done and if you can be this creative with male shirts, you can also do it for females.' So that motivated me to go into the female line. And my shirts aren't just regular corporate shirts you can wear to class and stuff, and nowadays, I have noticed that people want to wear something different, something unique and customized. So, the female line is just coming up.

Can you give an estimate of your current market?

I have sold over 400 shirts as at now and that's because I deal only with shirts; I'm a shirt maker.

As a designer, you must be unique and also very creative. I've done a lot of shirts and one major thing I avoid is repeating a particular concept too often and I have my own style, I think that is basically all about that.

How far has that award taken you?

That was actually my first award ever. And as for the response, it has definitely increased my sales. It has given me and my products more awareness because I've been in this business for so long but I haven't been able to partake in any fashion show. I've been invited for some shows but I haven't been able to make it due to restrictions in school and other stuff. So Redefinition was my first.

Looking at the Redefinition fashion show. You've been in the industry for a while now, how would you rate the organization of the whole show? It was alright. It wasn't the best but they can still do better.

You got the Creativity award but Apapa turned out the best. Is his market better than yours and has he interfered with your market? I don't think so. Apapa stole the show that day, But I'm not sure about his market interfering with mine, I deal strictly with corporate shirts and he's more of a casual person so I don't see the link or the interference.

This book is a combined effort of some lecturers in their fields of study. This is a scholarly work. It discusses issues in the print, broadcast and as well as Public Relations writings. It also provides foundation for the aspiring scholar who needs to know what academic writing is all

about.

This book has four parts and twelve chapters. The first part focuses on the basics of communication. It expatiates more on the basic rules guiding writing, how to write an error free piece, writing and rewriting of your piece and the *meta-discourse* in academic communication. Meta-discourse here means some spoken words, which do not add anything to the prepositional content but intend to help the listener organize, interpret and evaluate the information supplied.

The second part of this book discusses how to write for the print media. Here, we are told that skill and professional handling of lead construction could make the arrangement of the facts in the body of the news story easier. Some contemporary issues on the functions and qualities of a critical writing as well as reviews are also discussed. Theories of communication are given some space while the way to writing a


good feature story is outlined.

Part three focuses on broadcast media writing. It explores the fundamental broadcast media, how to write a documentary and a radio and television drama. The last part of this book anchors its discussion on writing for Public Relations.

In the book there is a display of a clear language of expression. Examples are given to drive home points. The arrangement of the book is splendid and the contents appropriate, relevant and illuminating

However, there are few typographical errors. But you can overlook ithem. The graphics used for the cover page are appropriate, likewise the colour, which makes the personality of the book attractive. Students of communication and lecturers alike will find this book beneficial and worthwhile in their various fields of studies.

Copywriting is a crucial aspect of advertising and books that treat it are hard to come by. I have an idea is therefore a pioneer. The book, which has an attractive personality, is actually a reflection of the author, who has a track record as an advertising practitioner in Nigeria. This is a book which has an intellectual base which might not be easily recognized by any reader who easily gets captivated by aesthetics which it is loaded with.

I have an Idea has eleven chapters. Basically the author, in these chapters, take the reader on a tour of advertising and marketing definitions, what copywriting is and is not, copywriting basics and the concomitant steps that need to be taken.

Secondly, she delves into

consumers' need and insight as strong points of reference if you want to make any impact as a good copywriter. These two factors are triggers that must be pulled if you must hit the target as a good writer.

She stresses the need to get aware of the media types as well as media environment. By having this knowledge of the media, you are empowered to communicate your thoughts in a way that can easily be deciphered by your audience. She buttresses her point with some successful advert copies.

This book is very useful. First, it is filling the gap caused by the dearth of literature on copywriting. Second, it has set the stage for aspiring authors who might want to write on the same area. Thirdly, it has also set the standard for such aspiring authors.

The book will be successful in market. This may sound like a blanket statement but it has been proved from experience that initially such books may be a little slow but as time goes by, the road will be clear for a good sell.



But there is a caveat! Madam, when you are coming with the next edition, please let the title carry the word "copywriting" because as it is now, there is nothing to suggest that the book is about this important area of advertising. The title is too general.






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Getting our acts right for 2007

Dental hygiene

Dental Hygiene refers to maintaining a clean and healthy mouth, teeth and gums to prevent oral diseases by doing regular hygienic practices like brushing, flossing and visit to the dentist at a regular interval for check up. It can also be referred as oral hygiene. Cavities, gingivitis etc are the destroyers of exceptional oral assets.

Having bacteria in the mouth is normal; this is because these bacteria's strive in a moist environment just like the mouth. Bacteria which are tiny colonies of living organisms are constantly on the move in the teeth, gums, lips and tongue.

Certain types of bacteria, however, can attach themselves to hard surfaces like the enamel that covers the teeth. If they are not removed, they multiply and grow in number until a colony forms and more bacteria of different types attach to the colony already growing on the tooth enamel. Proteins that are present in the saliva (spit) also mix in and the bacteria colony becomes a whitish film on the tooth. This film is called plaque, and it's what causes cavities.

To prevent these enemies from attacking teeth and gums, proper dental or oral hygienic needs must be considered. The dental hygiene prevents bad breadth, dental disorder and plaque deposition

Saliva helps to

wash food particles from the mouth and lessen the damage from acid.


Since the mouth is a busy place, preventive measures for stopping dental disorders should include personal examination and cleaning of

the teeth. Tooth brushing for instance is important, and it is recommended that brushing is done after every meal or at least twice a day, in the morning and the last thing at night before going to bed. It is very vital that toothbrushes are changed at the end of every three months, graded toothbrushes medium, soft etc should be most preferred to any

other types. Hard toothbrushes and over enthusiastic brushing of the teeth also causes tears in the ligaments and it weakens the gum. Healthy gums characteristics are being pink and firm. The teeth should be carefully swept and not scrubbed, except for the grinding surfaces that demands concentrated cleaning.

Dairy Products are also of significant importance, they

include yogurt, cheese, milk and milk products etc. Everything that's made from milk is a good source of calcium which is an essential nutrient for the development of bones and teeth. Also, some scientific studies have shown that eating cheese might help to protect the teeth from cavities by preventing demineralization (the loss of important calcium in the teeth).



Tips for slimmingdown

Set yourself feasible goals - don't set out for a weight loss of more than 2lbs per week. Reduce fiber intake.

Reduce fat intake

Start taking 5 to 6 meals (very short ones) perday and spacing them about 1 every three hours) so that you are eating quiet often but not more.

Increase the consumption of protein in your

diet.

Increase your water intake.

Eat smaller portions of food and eat more slowly, enjoying the flavor.

When you feel full, stop eating and leave food on the plate.

Have a morning walk daily.

Be as lively as possible in your day to day

Have time specific exercise sessions three times per week.

Keep provoked. Always remind yourself that

you want to lose weight and figure out yourself how you want to appear.

Here are tips that will help you look slimmer. Try wearing dark colored clothes such as black, dark blue dark purple etc. Avoid wearing clothes that are too tight for

Use accessories such as necklaces, earrings so that you gain attention to your face. Wear high heels- This will help in distributing your weight over a new height.

Use detangling conditioners. Try it, it helps to remove the tangles from your hair especially after loosening braids.




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
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


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Meet Funmilola, an upcoming star

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
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
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
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
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
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












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CHD makes female football mpressive in CU

Coach speaks on the future of sports in Covenant University

Bukola- Good Afternoon sir **Coachy-** Good Afternoon, you're welcome

Bukola-May we know you sir?

Coachy- Hmm... where do I start form? Well, my name is Bayo Oluwatokin. I hail from Oyo state and I attended OAU as well as Ahmadu Bello University and the National Institute for sports, that's the school of the coaches. Apart from the 1st and 2nd degrees, I have also had the privilege of attending several coaching colleges like the FIFA/NFA youth coaching course, CAF/NFA advanced coaching course, then the highest of it all, the FIFA High Level coaching course and by the grace of god, that is so far we've been able to go as regards the profession. But, I've been involved in the job for many years now, close to um... 20 years. I was once a footballer, played for several clubs. played for Oyo State Academical, played for NIPOST football club, Ibadan, Water Corporation football club, also Ibadan, and also played for Leventis United. Incidentally, all these clubs have gone into the oblivion now. I also played for my school anyway and I switched over to coaching. I started with the Oyo State Sports Council from where I moved to work with another professional outfit, to work as a technical consultant. That's um... The Sports Consultant and from there, I moved up North where I worked with the Federal College of Education for close to 12 years before coming over to Covenant University and of course, while I was there too, I still had other things doing as serving as a technical consultant to many of the Nigerian professional and premier league teams, designing programmes for coaching clinics and seminars for states, sports councils and local government.

Marcus- Your family sir?

Coachy- Well, I'm married and have three kids... 2 boys and a girl. The name of my wife is Joke, children, we have Deola, Tola and we have Eniola. Deola and Tola are boys, Eniola is a girl.

Marcus- when did you join Covenant University?

Coachy-I came in late 2004

Bukola- How has your stay in Covenant University been?

Coachy- its been a very pleasant experience, I must confess to you though challenging but I think because of my background and exposure, it was like I was being prepared ahead of this assignment to come over here but one good thing is compared to every other places I've worked or I've heen involved. One, you are

recognized as the man in your field here. It is not the issue of somebody is pokenosing into your issue of: what are you doing there or This is how to do your job and that's one thing, the tools to work with are also made available on time, if not in excess, but we've been enjoying maximum support from the management concerning the assignment.

Marcus- when you came, how was the sport scenario like?

Coachy- well, you know when you're getting into a

new place, you have to find out what is happening there and that will inform how you'll go about whatever you have in mind. I think, as then, the only majorly known competition that was going on was what was called the Chancellor's Cup, then, where they have their inter-club league competition and I think that was the same year the Chancellor donated the trophy for the championship. There wasn't much compared to now. I think it was only limited to football and basketball probably but if we look at that period till now, a lot of things have taken place and we can say that we have expanded the scope of the sporting activities even though we have not reached where we are going, but far far better, at least the level of awareness is more than what we had then.

activities in Covenant University in the next five/ten years from now, or is there an already planned outline?

Coachy- well, thank you very much. It is one thing to have your own programme and your focus on whatever you want to do, and its another thing to run in line with the vision of the institution. And of course, what we've been trying to do is to tailor what we're doing along the fine of the Covenant University vision because anything outside that will make us look like we're not achieving the objectives but all the same, we have programmes that we have put together as projections, the short terms, the long terms, and part of it still has to do with our being engaged with other institutions outside, especially, a participation with other schools.

Bukola- Talking about the participation with other schools, why hasn't CU team been granted the opportunity to participate in the Nigerian Private University Games Association (NPUGA) Games.

Association (NPUGA) Games.

Coachy- Normally when you're laying the

foundation, there are a lot of prizes to pay and I believe that's what is happening now with NUPGA games. The way the students will see our going to participate in any competition, the management may not see that way because they see more and because they understand they understand the vision more than the student. That is not saying that the management is not allowing us to go out, but I believe with time, we'll get over that. We are a strong financial member of the Nigerian Private University Games Association, and by the grace of God, the extent to which the association has developed today has been by the major contribution of Covenant University to the extent that if we do not come for any meeting, they want to find out what exactly is happening to us. So we have as part of our plans to fully get involved in taking part in the NPUGA Games. Like this out going session, we had an international invitation that was sent to us from Sweden and I got that through the registrar and later, they even sent to us the brochure for the championship. But as the institution normally does at the beginning of the session, you have to make your budget proposal so it is not something that you just wake up and say: okay, we're going for this, so I think that was one of the major reasons why we could not go for... (searches through his files for the invitation) ... World Inter-University games, Dublin. Covenant University was invited, not that we wrote them, they got the details of our university from the net and they wrote but we couldn't maker it. So these are the type of things we look forward to in the nearest future that we'll be able to get involved and project the image of the university

Bukola- how do you see co-operation from the students?

Coachy—Well, the awareness is still not very high in terms of the participation, I think its because we have several conflicting problems or interests. Take for example, somebody that is supposed to be at the training, will tell you I have dance rehearsals (laughs) so his or her mind is divided into wanting to be at the dance rehearsal and at the same time want to come and train. I think the ability to set priorities right, we're still trying to sort it out but we want to get much more involved in displaying the

inter-varsity friendly especially back at home when we play and other students see, they will get more interested in taking part. I believe that by the time our stadium complex is fully ready, where we more space to do several other things, we'll be able to do that.

Marcus- we have noticed that emphasis have not been made on other sporting activities like javelin, throw, and the likes. What do you have to say about that sir?

Coachy-yes, its not that there's no emphasis on it, we have it as part of our blue print for track and field athletics but you know the major of track and field double player sport that cannot be done anyhow unlike football that you can colonize a corridor and you're playing. Volleyball, you can colonize it too as well. You cannot start running on concrete, this and some other reasons are why the track and field has been suspended temporarily until our stadium is fully ready and I can tell you that with the priviledged information and involvement, we are having one of the best around in terms of having the tartan track, what is obtainable in any international stadium, either within or outside Nigeria. So when the stadium is fully on ground then we can conveniently accommodate track and filed events. So, we've been having the athletics team training but the rushness were becoming more on the quota there, we had to ask them to suspend because even for them, its not of their interest.

Bukola- talking about the stadium, what exactly should we expect of it?

Coachy- yes, let me first of all say that the stadium complex is, by the design, a place with

facilities that will attract the interest from every part of the society particularly, maybe, our national teams and I can conveniently tell you that like some of the things that we have in there, the sitting capacity is 20,000 to start with and that is also going to be surround with several shopping complex displaying different types of wears and commodities. We're also having the indoor sports, multipurpose, which will also have the fitness rooms, human bathrooms, laboratories for sports, sports library, sports shop, the gym where the students can come and exercise on different types of machine and get more fitter. That's about the indoor and we also have the swimming pool complex. We have the outdoor court for volley ball, basketball, handball, tennis and also in projection is a hall for squash racket game and we have the hockey pitch too and of

course you're already



aware of the new cafeteria that is supposed to serve as a resting point after training or a match.

Bukola- when should we expect all these? Coachy- Yes, concerning when we expect all these to be on ground, if you've noticed one thing about this commission, there projects are always in phases and once they grab a phase, they make sure the phase is completed within the time set and the same thing has been done t the sports complex. According to the project supervisor for now, it has been divided into two phases. What you're seeing out there is the 1st phase which comprises the construction of the swimming pool complex, the outdoor court, the hockey pitch, the soccer pitch round the long sides while the next place will comprise the 2 bends of the stadium then the indoor sport. So by what is on ground now, we're told to expect the 1st phase to be handed over before December this year, because for the field, what is left is for them to put the sand and then start the planting of the grass.



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Why Italy won the world cup






This victory cappped an incredible period for Italian football, with the domestic game embroiled in a corruption scandal similar to 1982 when they last won the World Cup. They have now won the competition four times, one fewer than Brazil, and it is the first time they managed to win a World Cup match on penalties after three failed attempts.







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
