

Dr. Oyedepo Unveils Vision 7-7-2030 to Reposition Covenant for Global Impact

fter emerging as Nigeria's and West Africa's best-ranked University in the latest Times Higher Education (THE) ranking of world universities, Covenant University, with the backing of the Board of Regents of the University, is undertaking a 7-year, 7-Points Prophetic Agenda from 2023 through 2030.

The Chancellor and Chairman, Board of Regents of Covenant University, Dr. David Oyedepo, while unveiling the 7-Years: 7-Points Prophetic Agenda, said where any vision stops is where stagnation and frustration set in, because no man can arrive at a future he cannot see, nor will anyone or organization arrive anywhere not prepared for it.

According to Dr. Oyedepo, the core areas of focus for the next 7 years will be the full-blown actualization of the Covenant University Open and Distance Learning courses for first and postgraduate degrees, with a target of reaching 100,000 enrolments within the next 7 years.

In addition, the period under consideration will witness an approach review of the existing Entrepreneurship Development Studies (EDS) Programme of the University to ensure the impact is measured by the entrepreneurial endeavours of graduates of the centre.

He said Vision 7:7:2030 will see a renewed drive towards the full actualization of the University's leadership development programmes as a globally acceptable brand by offering Leadership Certificates and degrees at the post-graduate levels for M.Sc and Ph.D scholars.

In addition, Dr. Oyedepo said exposure and capacity building for global competitiveness will be a strong mandate during the time frame, as there will be a revamping of institutional support for conferences, seminars, workshops, and other capacity-building endeavours.

He concluded by charging the University personnel to work at training students to devise legitimate means for making a living, equipping them for a creative, innovative, and productive lifestyle, and helping them see opportunities amid adversity.



Northeastern University Firms up Collaboration Initiative with Covenant University

The senior leadership of Northeastern The Director of Covenant University University, Boston, Massachusetts, United States of America, is on a mission to advance the Memorandum of Understanding between Covenant University and Northeastern University.

The Vice President for Global Network Expansion at Northeastern University, Gbemi Disu, said their visit to Covenant was to learn more about how to give life to the existing MoU, noting that Nigeria has a pool of talented folks that, when well harnessed in partnership with Covenant University, will help drive excellence.

Ms. Disu said their partnership will be tailored towards helping students get more skills, develop competence, and evolve alliances between colleges and programmes in both universities, especially in the area of institutional and individual research.

"We are here to listen to and understand the strategic vision and mission of Covenant University and see possible areas of alignment and promising partnership, with research and student exchange being possible points of focus," she added.

International Office of Linkages, Dr. Isaac Akinwunmi, while appreciating the management of Northeastern University for the visit, called for the immediate engagement of the framework of the existing MoU between both institutions.

According to him, the collaboration can get underway in the region of graduate student exchange programmes, joint research endeavours and faculty exchange initiatives.

In his remarks, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Abiodun H. Adebayo, said Covenant University was enthused about the prospect of partnering with Northeastern University and hoped that the existing framework would be a very good one to commence the intended partnership.

He said it is important to identify mutual areas of interest and start working on the partnership to the point of fruition. "We are excited at the prospect of this collaboration, and we will work with you to make a success of this intended partnership," he added.

Professor Adebayo promised the delegation of Covenant University's representation at the public in-person educational event in Nigeria organised by Northeastern University.

RELEASE OF EAGLES 2023

Release Of Eagles 2023:

283 Students Bag 1st Class Degrees



he Vice-Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor Abiodun H. Adebayo, has disclosed that 238 students graduated with First Class Honors among the 1,379 graduates in various degrees, in the 2022/2023 academic session.

Adebayo disclosed this on Friday, September 29, 2023, during the 18th convocation ceremony, conferment of degrees, and presentation of prizes held at the University Chapel, in Ota, Ogun State.

In his words, "I am pleased to inform this distinguished audience that today, we are celebrating the products of our life-applicable learning factory with the conferment of 1,175 Bachelor's and 204 higher degrees in various disciplines, having found the graduates worthy in character and in learning. In the Bachelor's degree category, 283 (24.09%) of the graduates made First Class, while 656 (55.83%) are in the Second Class (Upper Division). Also, 214 (18.21%) of the graduates are in the Second Class (Lower Division), and 22 (1.87%) of the graduates are in the Third Class category.

"In the higher degree category, there are 57 persons who are being awarded the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) degree. In the Master's degree category, there are one hundred and seven (107) persons graduating with a Master of Science (M.Sc.) degree, twenty-seven (27) obtaining a Master of Engineering (M.Eng.) degree, while two (2) persons are being conferred with Master

of Arts (M.A.) degree. Also, in the professional graduate programme category, eleven (11) of the graduates are being conferred with Master in Business Administration (MBA) degree."

Adebayo, while congratulating the graduates, urged them to embrace the virtue of an eagle which endures storm to earn its honor.

"I want to congratulate the class of 2023 as you are released as Eagles today. It is evident that you have been equipped to soar higher and conquer unimaginable feats in the name of Jesus Christ. Please don't despair even when the journey gets tough and stormy but remember that an eagle earns its honor from the storms it endures," he stated.

Nelson Ifechukwu, a student in the Department of Electrical Electronics Engineering, College of Engineering, emerged as the best-graduating student with a Cumulative Grade Point Average of 4.98.

"The Covenant's mission is to transform students into experts, thinkers, innovative managers and resourceful technocrats in all fields of learning, thus restoring relevance to the university context in Africa," he said.

The vice-chancellor said that the institution was ranked first in Nigeria, first in West Africa and 7th in Africa by the Times Higher Education World University and Impact Rankings.

He added that Covenant is the only private university among all Nigerian universities in the 2023 ranking, making it the best private university in Nigeria and Africa.

It is Futile to Wait for the West to Develop Africa –VC

his is the submission of the Vice-Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor Abiodun Adebayo on Monday at the opening session of the OS Africa Forum 2023.

The forum with the theme, 'Education Africa 2023 and Beyond-Sustainability and Social Impact in African Context,' was organized by QS (Quacquarelli Symonds) United Kingdom and hosted by Covenant University.

Speaking at the event, Professor Adebayo emphasized that the West have peculiar problems they are dealing with without solutions yet in place, and so cannot be focused on offering solutions to African issues. He therefore called on Africans to look inward for solutions.

"Only Africans, Nigerians, Ghanaians, South Africans, etc., can solve their peculiar problems. Let us not always run to the West, we have what it takes here, the indigenous content that can help us begin to change our narratives as Africans are all around us," he explained.

The Vice-Chancellor also explained other benefits of the QS Ranking to African universities. "As you know, Africa's reputation needs to be rebranded and this is part of the rebranding mechanism, to ensure Africa takes its rightful place among the committee of nations.

"It also affords the universities in Africa opportunities to network and see how we can form a formidable synergy that will lead to the emancipation and transformation of Africa. We are going to form a strategic committee that will be championed by Covenant University with the QS team and some other stakeholders in African higher education, to see how the peculiarity of Africa can be taken into the ranking process. The whole essence of ranking is not about being number one or two but to enhance impact, visibility, and regional networking," he said.











CAPIC-ACE, Illumina, ISN to Partner in Advancing Research in Genomics, Healthcare Matters

combine team from Illumina and Industrial Scientific and Nutritional Product Nigeria Limited on a working visit to Covenant University have stated their readiness to partner with Covenant Applied Informatics and Communication Africa Centre of Excellence (CApIC-ACE) with a view to help the Centre attain her full potentials with the assemblage of research equipment at the centre.

The team lead and Executive Partner/Account Manager of Illumina, Mr Rodolphe Vetchenou, made this know during a parley with the Management of Covenant and the leadership of the University's World Bank Centre of Excellence. intensive driven University, is well positioned among the elite global universities according to the Times Higher Education rankings of universities across the world, and as such will be looking for opportunities to further advance her research prowess, by working with Illumina and ISN in expanding the frontiers of cancer research and related studies.

"Let's get these equipment running, and see how we can save lives, considering the death in quality healthcare delivery our nation and continent," he added.

The meeting had in attendance the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Olujide Adekeye; Acting Registrar, Mrs Regina Tobi-David; Professor Olubanke Ogunlana; Professor Solomon Rotimi; Professor Grace Olasehinde; and Helen Jewvegaga.



Gym Exercises Upper Body:

1. Push-Ups:

- · Target Muscles: Chest, Shoulders, Triceps
- How To: Start in a plank position, lower your body towards the ground, then push back up.

2. Dumbbell Bench Press:

- · Target Muscles: Chest, Shoulders, Triceps
- How To: Lie on a bench, hold dumbbells

above your chest, and press them up and together.

3. Dumbbell Shoulder Press:

- · Target Muscles: Shoulders, Triceps
- · How To: Sit on a bench, hold dumbbells at shoulder height, then press them overhead.

4. Pull-Ups/Chin-Ups:

- · Target Muscles: Back, Biceps
- How To: Grip a bar with hands shoulder-width apart (pull-ups) or closer (chin-ups) and pull your body up.

5. Dumbbell Rows:

- Target Muscles: Back, Biceps
- How To: Bend forward at the hips, hold a dumbbell in each hand, and row them to your hips.

Core:

1. Plank:

- · Target Muscles: Core (Abs, Obliques)
- How To: Hold a push-up position with your body forming a straight line from head to heels.

2. Russian Twists:

- · Target Muscles: Obliques
- How To: Sit on the ground, lean back slightly, lift your feet, and twist your torso to touch the ground beside you with your hands.

3. Leg Raises:

- · Target Muscles: Lower Abs
- How To: Lie on your back, lift your legs upward without bending your knees, then slowly lower them back down without letting them touch the ground.

4. Bicycle Crunches:

- · Target Muscles: Abs
- · How To: Lie on your back, lift your legs, and alternately bring your opposite elbow towards your knee as you cycle your legs.

Lower Body:

1. Squats:

- Target Muscles: Quadriceps, Glutes, Hamstrings
- How To: Stand with feet shoulder-width apart, lower your body as if you are sitting back into a chair, then return to standing position.

2. Lunges:

- · Target Muscles: Quadriceps, Glutes, Hamstrings
- How To: Step forward into a lunge position, then return to the starting position and repeat on the other leg.

3. Deadlifts:

- · Target Muscles: Hamstrings, Glutes, Lower Back
- How To: Hold a barbell or dumbbells in front of your thighs, bend at your hips and knees to lower your body toward the ground, then return to a standing position.

4. Calf Raises:

- · Target Muscles: Calves
- How To: Stand on the edge of a step or a raised surface, lift your heels as high as possible, then lower them below the step.

It's essential to use proper form and start with appropriate weights to avoid injuries. If you're new to these exercises, consider working with a fitness trainer to learn the correct techniques. Also, always warm up before exercising and cool down afterward to prevent injuries and enhance flexibility.

With MARIZU By STREAM Magazine

STREAM: Tell us a little bit about who Marizu is.

MARIZU: My name is Marizu, I make music and from a Christian home. I am the first child of four siblings and I love making music.

STREAM: Since when have you been in the music industry?

MARIZU: I officially started making and releasing in 2017 till date.

STREAM: When did you start singing?

MARIZU: That was in 2013, then I got into university in 2014. I actively joined the choir in my school and in my fellowship. People used to tell me to consider making music but I didn't really listen to them until God told me to do it one day.

STREAM: How did you find your niche in Afro-Gospel?

MARIZU: My dad makes radio music and I remember telling him I wanted to make music too. He told me that I should be sure about it and know my why. Afro Gospel is not the only music genre I make, I make music in general hoping it reaches someone out there. I'm glad to be in the afro gospel wagon and it has helped me reach many people in Africa. I still want to do other genres in music as well.

STREAM: What was your inspiration to start making gospel music?

MARIZU: My dad was my inspiration, he inspired me on why and how he made music. He explained to me exactly what music is and it was exciting for me. I was very interested in doing what he was doing because I felt that was what God wanted for me. I just felt this push in my spirit to make music so that's why my dad is my inspiration. My pastor saw the streams and asked me if I had seen that my music was really doing well, and when I checked for myself, I was like "oh wow" and then, people started coming up to me to tell me what my song has done to them. STREAM: What is your message to a young person struggling to stand out for Christ in this trying world?

The Holy Spirit is not just the words you read in the bible, he is a person that live within you and when you realize that you can talk to him, He will guide you. Based on your field or genre, you need to understand and study the genre and that would require you studying some songs. But before you do that, realize that your heart is a fertile ground and what you put in there will grow. Be mindful, and take out the seeds planting themselves in your fertile ground so they won't grow and become things you did not plan for.







Featuring Boluwaduro Okunade

STREAM: Hello. Kindly tell us about yourself. Who is Mr. Bolu Okunade?

BOLU: I am Bolu Okunade. I am a human being, first of all. I am the second child of my parents, from Ogun State. I am a Covenant University student in my final year, studying Information and

Communication Engineering. I own three businesses and I am someone who is really passionate about seeing people become legitimately wealthy.

STREAM: When did you venture into the business world?

BOLU: I started getting into the business world when I was in my 100 Level, which was in 2018.

STREAM: How did you build an entrepreneurial spirit at a young age?

BOLU: Necessity moved me into entrepreneurship. I wasn't someone who said I wanted to change the world. I did not have much money. Coming into school, I always started with 6,000 Naira and I was never sure when the next allowance would come or where it would come from. As an engineering student in 100 Level, I needed 10,000 Naira for a TD Board and 4,000 Naira for course dues. I was always annoyed, so I

had to face the reality that I had to work to make money. Necessity sparked the need for me to start selling things.

STREAM: Tell us briefly about one of your companies.

BOLU: I'd like to talk about Zee-Realty. The name is derived from "Gen-Z." Zee-Realty is a company that primarily provides solutions to Gen-Z's property needs. Gen-Z individuals are relatively inexperienced in the property market. At Zee-Realty, we have extensive knowledge, and we connect Gen-Z individuals to major stakeholders, ensuring that all documentation is in order. We help Gen-Z's invest safely and profitably in real estate.

STREAM: What were some of the early challenges you faced in starting that business?

BOLU: One of the major challenges I faced was the prevailing culture in Africa that doesn't expect young people to become wealthy at a young age. Especially with the negative image portrayed by internet fraudsters ("Yahoo Boys"), people tend to be skeptical of young individuals who achieve financial success. Many didn't believe I legitimately made money at a young age.

STREAM: How were you able to overcome such a challenge as a young person?

BOLU: Trust is closely tied to age, so I realized that I

needed to invest a lot to earn the trust of people, especially older individuals who doubted a young person like myself could legitimately help them with property transactions. Trust is essential in the property market because it involves substantial sums of money. My team and I worked on

overcoming this cultural skepticism through our branding, communication, and appearance to give people fewer reasons not to trust us.

STREAM: How do you set boundaries and ensure you receive respect when working with your fellow Gen-Z's?

BOLU: I have never had a staff member disrespect me in any of my companies. There are objectives and metrics that my staff members are expected to meet. I also carry myself professionally. If a person ever rises to the point of disrespecting me, there is something wrong with them. I also ensure that I don't disrespect my staff members.

STREAM: What are your thoughts on entrepreneurship for young people in an economy

where jobs are difficult to find?

BOLU: I used to believe that everyone had to be an entrepreneur, but I no longer hold that view. I've realized that some people are meant to earn money through traditional employment. My advice is that you can think like an entrepreneur but find your unique expression points. Nowadays, we have "intrapreneurs" who have the mindset of entrepreneurs but work within existing organizations.

STREAM: What do you think it takes to be a successful businessperson in a generation like this?

BOLU: Mentorship is crucial. You don't have to start from scratch, make mistakes, and build everything on your own. Mentorship condenses years of experience into moments of learning. It's something I believe people can access. As a young person, you should realize that you can take calculated risks now, but it may become more

challenging later. Invest in knowledge, as they say, "your head is your first head office." Lastly, there's a dangerous desire for quick wealth because of the misleading images and statuses portrayed on social media platforms like Instagram. Trust the process, and understand that life doesn't work the way it's depicted on social media.

STREAM: What would you say to young people struggling to build successful businesses or balance their business lives with other aspects of their lives?

BOLU: I have a formula. In general science, Speed is the division of distance over time. If I need to cover 40 km, and I increase my speed, I will use less time. If I reduce my speed, it will take more time. My advice is to eliminate distractions and become strategic users of social media to make progress in this generation. Being strategic in our social media use helps control our focus, allowing us to accomplish more in less time.

am a proud student at Covenant University (I can't believe I'm saying this...it's still so surreal to me), studying International Relations, and here's how it all came to reality.



ASTRA: My name is Astra Otuekere. I work as a Public Health Officer. I have a lot of hobbies, but some of them are cooking, driving and having fun. I am married, and a mother of three young children.

STREAM: How does it feel to be a mother of this generation?

ASTRA: Wow, it feels really good and great. It has its challenges, of course. Nothing good comes easy in life but in the long run, it's a great feeling to be a mother of this generation.

STREAM: How are you able to manage being married, having children, and engaging in your career?

ASTRA: Wow. Well, what I do is I always have to sacrifice one thing for the other. After having my BSc, getting a job as a Public Health Officer, and getting married, I became pregnant for my first child and had to put a pause to my career. Before getting pregnant for my second children to happen to be twins, I was planning to have a Masters degree, Again, I had to pause getting my masters, gave them little time to grow up before I proceeded for my masters degree. For managing my marriage, I have a support system. My husband is supportive, I have a help too, so it's not really challenging for me. I always have to be with my twins because they are not even up two years. But because of this support system I have, I am able to effectively cope with being a wife, mother, and having a career.

STREAM: What are some of the things in our generation that has made parenting easier for you?

ASTRA: I think the electronic devices and social media. Through social media, I have gotten to learn a few things from some parenting groups on social media that teach things like how to

effectively get your children engaged, the best food and diet combination for children of different ages, and others. Through electronic devices, our generation has developed smartphones, TV's and TV channels with cartoons that can get children engaged and keeps them distracted from me while I get to do other personal things for myself.

STREAM: What are the challenges of parenting in this generation of technology and social media?

ASTRA: While technology and social media has sort of helped me in raising my kids, I will admit, it has its challenges. When parents do not try to pay attention to what your kids watch, censor what children see, that's where the challenge lies. My first child and daughter has a phone and I always have to be alert and to do a parental watch whereby if she wants to go to a particular site, I get notifications on my mail to permit whatever she wants to see or download. Parents have to be conscious, be involved, and deliberate of this. I think the problem of parenting in this generation is that parents are not as involved and deliberate about the things that are exposed to their children. Many parents of older generations also never related to their children as friends, they related to their children as soldiers and we were scared of them. So what I want to do differently is I don't want to make my children experience tough love. I want them to see me as a safe place, view me as a friend, see myself and their father as people they can run to for anything.



STREAM: What is your opinion about many Gen-Z's who have come out to say they don't want to be married or have children?

ASTRA: That's personal to them. They have one, two, or three reasons for this decision. I don't know their personal stories or their histories, where they're coming from, abuses they might have experienced so they might develop their decisions from this angle. Some Gen-Z girls have also developed their decision from the angle of wanting their bodies to remain as they are and do not want the fat, stomach, or body in general that comes with many pregnancies. Others, probably because of the stories of death during child birth, Post Traumatic Stress Decision, or postpartum depression. Anybody is allowed to make whatever decision they desire. However, in all, motherhood is very beautiful. It is like seeing a replica of yourself in somebody else. Some Gen-Z's also say they don't want to get married probably based on their personal experiences such as abusive relationships. They might also have heard negative things that influenced their decisions so it's personal.

Caught Between the **Devil's Kerosene**

and Deep Blue Sea's

Cooking Gas

A bout four years ago, the price of kerosene, Nigeria's most popular energy for cooking rose astronomically. Nigerians cried out. The problem was made complex by the Covid-19 pandemic. These cries prompted the government to mobilize the citizens for a change over to liquefied petroleum gas (LPG). The switch was huge to the extent that most residents of prominent towns and cities now depend heavily and in some cases solely on gas. Now, the price of gas has soared, making it unaffordable to Nigerians.

One Iyana Iyesi (Ota) resident John Okoghene cried out: "What on earth does the government want from us the citizens? Electricity is out of reach, kerosene is out of reach, and now the gas price has risen beyond the heavens. This is shameful. Our politicians are

criminals. They do not feel the pain, so they can't know how it feels. Middle-aged Wuraola Imade also resides in Iyana Iyesi: "It baffles me that the government

cannot control inflation. The cost of gas has skyrocketed more than 20 times and these politicians are not

doing about it. Shame on all of them. I have decided to switch to charcoal."

Before the advent of Covid-19, a kilogram of gas sold for only N90 which, though costly then, was affordable. This was unlike kerosene which sold for N350 per liter. Shortly after the Covid-19, the price of gas doubled. The user still preferred gas since it appears one to two kilograms of gas equals one liter of kerosene. Between 2020 and 2022, they rose more than ten times, and fast forward to January 2023, a kilogram of gas went for N700! Now it costs some N850 per kilogram.

Filling station owners said the problem is not from their end. "It is what we buy that we sell. If I tell you how small our margin is, you won't believe it. Our margin is less than ten naira on a kilo," according to Majek Lawson, a dealer close to the Mobil Filling station at Obasanjo Junction in Ota. If you go to Mobil over there, the price is about the same. Mine is only about The gas dispenser attendant at the Mobil who did not want his name published because he was not authorized to speak on the matter, confirmed Lawson's narrative, saying that there are more people in the queue in his station because of one or two-naira difference per kilogram compared to that of Lawson.

At a main gas depot of the Nigerian LNG, the

consortium in charge of gas supply, the complaints are similar. An official who preferred anonymity said that the high price gas prices are a result of the devaluation of the naira and foreign exchange pressures, which means that the company pays more to procure spares, service their assets, and pay the expatriate staff who are still in the employ of the company. "I can assure you that when the value of the naira improves, gas prices will deescalate," he said. It appears that Tinubu's administration is sensitive to the situation. The recent crash of the dollar, which brought the naira up to N900 from N1250 in exchange due to the government's efforts is expected to rob off on gas purchases. But until Nigerians experience the change, the struggle continues between the Devil's kerosene and cooking Gas' Deep





How Perennial Flooding is Undermining Nigeria's of genuine concern is not true: "If you notice, they have been saying the same thing for over eight years since Buhari came to power. The **Food Security**

recent Consumer Price Index report released by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) shows that inflation peaked at 21 percent in September 2023, one percent higher than the August figures. The average monthly index hovers around nearly 2.0 percent. The inflation onslaught has rendered Nigerians comatose as millions are no longer able to afford the necessities of life. Many factors are responsible for this nemesis. First, is the extremely poor leadership. The Buhari administration which handed power to President Bola Tinubu is regarded as the most incompetent, corrupt, and wicked regime ever, going by the poor leadership, coupled with the Covid-19 tragedy.

Second is the low foreign exchange portfolio which means that too many naira are chasing too few dollars, thereby leading to the current runaway inflation that has taken food beyond the reach of Nigerians in their millions. But there is yet another serious problem that both the government and the citizens are not talking about, and which happens to be the hunger trigger - the perennial flooding that has put many areas on the edge in the country.

Flooding is a cankerworm that is eating deep into the Nigerian fabric. Except for such lucky states as Borno, Benue, and Plateau, no fewer than 32 states of the federation are suffering severe consequences of perennial and calamitous, flooding. These states include Lagos, Ogun, Ondo, Ekiti, Rivers, Sokoto, Zamfara, Taraba, Ebony, Kaduna and Akwa Ibom.

One critical consequence is food insecurity. According to NBS and the International Monetary Fund (IMF), some six out of ten Nigerians do not have enough to eat and the numbers keep growing. IMF has cried aloud that if the calamitous flooding cases in the country were not checked, they would aggravate hunger in the land and escalate food insecurity.

According to Farid Mai of the African Department of IMF, his organization was aware of the challenge of the perennial flood and how it had affected Nigeria and its neighbors, especially Chad and Cameroon. Mai noted that the problem is complicated because Nigeria lacks the requisite early warning systems - a reason why the disaster has wreaked havoc on the nation's transportation systems, and

telecommunication infrastructure.

However, the area where it appears all hope is lost in terms of flood control is in agriculture where thousands of farmers are rendered useless as their farmlands have been washed away. There have been cries from several quarters that Nigeria and its Sub-Saharan neighbors are among the most insecure regions in Africa due to their vulnerability to climate change, the most visible ramifications of which are perennial flooding. One of the concerning outcomes is the yearly \$10 billion in food importation that complements the little that is produced locally to feed a population of 210 million people. This population is projected to balloon to nearly 300 in 2050 when Nigeria would have become the third most populous country in the world.

The Minister of Agriculture Dr. Abubakar Mohammed, said in an interview that the government was not unaware of the disaster caused by the perennial flooding, claiming that the government has mapped the agricultural areas and farming settlements that have been affected by flooding and doing everything governmentally possible to ensure they are adequately protected. The Nation quoted him as saying that "the government, through various interventions, is doing everything possible with our development partners to ensure that the floods do not cause food shortage in the country. We are making sure that production does not stop; we are also intensifying effort at dry season farming."

Another issue that makes the flooding problem complex is that the people affected by the flood disaster do not believe that the government is genuinely concerned about the problem. A community leader in Meiran, Lagos, Mr Adenity Hassan, told Stream that the government's claim situation has not changed with the present Bola Tinubu presidency. They claim they are doing something but in reality, they are doing nothing about the problem.

As a result of the grave issues arising from flooding, achieving sustainable development goals becomes problematic. SDG 1 is about the elimination of poverty, and adequate food provision is one of the critical elimination elements. By washing off agricultural lands and farming settlements, food production sustainability becomes a huge task that remains undone most of the time. The chairman of the Non-Governmental Organization (NGO), Flood Watch (FW), Fila Nelson, notes that the more flooding problem, the worse the food security situation becomes in the country. Therefore, according to him, the achievement of SDG 1 and 2, which is basically about the elimination of hunger and poverty among the teeming populace, cannot be overemphasized.


In the Flood Watch members' discussion with the Stream team on how the perennial flooding problem can be minimized, the following solutions to the problems were arrived at:

- Nigeria should work hard to enhance its early warning systems and capability to ensure that flooding wreaks less havoc. Nelson agrees that the current early warning systems of the Nigerian metrological agency need to be revamped to make them useful.
- b. Education and enlightenment programs are needed to sensitize people to the problem. Nelson's colleague, Timothy Duru, notes that "it is unfortunate that flood control and improved agricultural output are not prioritized in primary and secondary school teaching. Even in our universities and tertiary education, they are minimized. And what's more, the nation's agricultural training institutes are not doing enough if they do anything at all"
- c. A long-term solution is the best approach to








ovenant University has convoked a total of 1, 379 persons for graduation in the 18" edition of the Release of Eagles held on its campus on September 29, 2023. The College of Leadership and Development Studies (CLDS) has 15 Masters and eight PhDs, the College of Management and Social Sciences (CMSS) has 34 Masters and 15 PhDs, the College of Engineering (COE), has 27 Masters and 13 PhDs while the college of science and technology (CST) had 71 Masters and 21 PhDs.

In the case of undergraduates, CLDS had 157 out of which 21 had a first class, 87 2¹, 47 2², and 2 3". CMSS had 59, 198, 60, and 6 respectively. COE had a whopping 129, 200, 48, and 9 while CST had 74, 171, 59, and 5 respectively. The best students in this year's graduation are CLDS Oluwatoyin AKinjiola of International Relations with a CGPA of 4.88, CMSS Teniola Morinsola of Accounting with the CGPA of 4.90, COE Nelson Elijah Ifechukwu of Electrical and Electronic Engineering with 4.90, and

CST Sogunle Rosemary of Computer Science with the CGPA of 4.97.

The Chancellor and Chairman of the University's Board of Regents, Dr. David Oyedepo reiterated the emphasis and commitment to the promotion of the man-child model of education, which means making men out of children, stirring accelerated maturity intellectually and spiritually through custom-built programs. He stressed the highflying success of the graduates emerged from the foundation of the institution's core values of spirituality, integrity, possibility mentality, capacity building, responsibility, diligence, and sacrifice.

The Pro-chancellor, Bishop David Abioye congratulated the graduating class, their parents and guardians as well as the family members present at the occasion and admonished them on a few things. The Mass Communication Department of Covenant University now has a new head. She is Dr. Stella Aririguzo, an associate professor. She joined the University on September 1, 2003. After the COVID-19 pandemic, the commission announced the Core Curriculum and Minimum Academic Standards, CCMAS, that Mass Communication has been split into eight different disciplines namely Journalism and Media Studies, Broadcasting, Advertising, Public Relations and Strategic Communication, Development

Communication Studies, Strategic Communication, Film and Multimedia, information and Media Studies, and Mass Communication. In the case of mass communication, the discipline was massively scaled down and it is nothing compared to the omnibus one from where it was extracted. The Mass Communication Department inaugurated the

unbundled regime with the shortened version of mass communication.





resolve the issues of flooding in the country, especially in the context of food security. According to Duru, this involves the following:

- Reliable policies should be reworked and vigorously implemented. One such policy is the one that tackles the menace of waste dumping. Flood control cannot succeed if people continue to disobey the rules that take care of the environment.
- Construction of underground drainages. Since the money to do this does not come cheap, the government should have a budgetary allocation each year for the construction of functional drainages. The residents of the Imota community in the Ikorodu area of Lagos State which plays host to Africa's largest rice mill, are already calling on the Lagos government to construct proper drainage to ensure that the rice milling complex does not go down the drain. The nation's drainage systems, whether at the federal, state, or local government levels, are nothing to write home about at present.
- The government and the relevant agencies should have the proper programs in place to check the spread of diseases from flooding. The International Rescue Committee (IRC) and United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) have, over the years, been craving the government's attention on the need for these programs. This is the time to act.

The focused discussion panel also agrees that the climate change priorities of the government must be reworked. Investigations show that Nigeria contributes less than 1 percent of the global greenhouse emissions while the countries of the Global North are the main cause of more than half. The Nigerian government should begin to press these countries for support since their disastrous emission troubles are chief triggers of the climate change that causes the perennial flooding. They should be told to take responsibility for their ruinous activities.

How to Get Local Government Roads in Ota Paved

ta, the industrial town bordering Lagos to the west, is the capital of the Ado Odo-Ota Local Government, and one of the subdivisions in Ogun State of Nigeria. The town is one of the most industrialized in Nigeria. It houses the largest church service building - Faith Tabernacle built by Winners Chapel of the Living Faith Church Worldwide. What is more, Ota has the largest concentration of higher institutions in Ogun State with at least three universities. Ota is the traditional capital of the Awori, a Yoruba ethnic group. One thing has reduced the town to insignificance - bad roads.

The poor condition of roads in this ancient is such that people residents and commuters are frustrated as they have to use those bad roads to go to their houses and met in my life. Do you know that these people have lived with bad roads for decades and none has ever thought of coming up with solutions to the

problem; none! All they rely on is the allocation from the federal government which they claim to spend on clearing drainages and other irrelevant things that are meaningless to commuters

The article is not about complaints. It is to enlighten local government officials and residents on how resources can be mobilized and channeled towards the construction of those roads in the custody of local government. There are three categories of roads in Ota namely Federal, Before prescribing what can be done to significantly improve the conditions of the local government roads, it is important to warn that if the local government officials do not change their orientation about grassroots development, which means thinking out of the box, nothing will change concerning the roads. These officials should note that government is not the only source of funds for grassroots development. They should know that there are several other ways resources can be mobilized to construct roads. One of these is PPP - Private Public Participation. PPP is proof that government is incapable of constructing goods





workplaces. For example, people have to go to such places as Covenant University, The Bells University, Crawford University, Winners Chapel's Canaan land, African Leadership Forum, African Distilleries, Nestle, President Paints, Nigeria Navy School of Music, Veepee Industry, De United Foods (makers of Indomie), Honda Manufacturing Limited just to mention a few, as these places are the sources of their livelihood.

It is not unusual to see people fagged out and splashed with dirty flood water when resuming in the morning as going back home at the close of work becomes a nightmare. The condition of the roads is so bad that the famous singer Idris Abdulkareem sang a song that went viral about how the Governor of Ogun State, Dapo Abiodun, is collecting so much revenue from tax but using the proceeds to develop other areas in the state. Many Ota residents believe that this narrative is part of the alleged discrimination against the Awori people. Idowu Olofinde said: "We shouldn't be surprised. This is part of the gang-up to frustrate Ota and its environs."

What is more troubling, concerning the poor roads in Ota, is that the local government officials lack the initiative to proffer solutions to the problems. One Awori man said: the LG civil servants are the most unreliable and irresponsible set of people I have ever State, and Local Government. Federal government roads include Sokoto Road, the Ota-Idi Iroko road which is dualized from the Sango Under Bridge up to the Canaanland - where the gigantic worship place-Faith Tabernacle is situated, and the Atan-Agbara Road that links with Badagry Expressway. State roads include Itele Road, Old Ota Road, Iyana Iyesi Road, Lamaco Road, and Olawole Street. Every other road is in the domain of the local government.

the development of these roads.

Several local government roads can be constructed on the PPP model. This paper zeroed in on two of them. One of the Bells University Road which starts from the The Bells Junction bus stop down to the Ilogbo Swamp and from there to the llogbo town. Builders and real estate developers say that a bridge should be constructed in the swamp to be tolled. There are already alternative roads that lead to Ilogbo which makes it easier for those who do not want to use the tolled bridge to get to their destination.

Close to this is Tipper Garage-llogbo-ljako Owode road. The 20-kilometer road is fully matured for the PPP. Besides the more than two alternative routes that are available for motorists who prefer them, the residents of the area said they are more than willing to pay anything between N100 and N1000 toll fees depending on the type of vehicle. According to Segun Agseg, an automobile technician, "we are already to pay the toll. The toll is nothing compared to the amount that people spend on car repairs. We are ready to give the constructors all the support they need to succeed." But the question remains, are the local government officials ready to change their current unproductive thinking pattern?



I wasn't reading much and I got my lowest result in my 100 Level. 



RUKOME: The plan is to go to England to try football for a year. If it doesn't work out (though I believe it will), I will do my master's.


STREAM: Would you say your academic grind is just a façade?
